A BILL

To adopt a certain California flammability standard as a Federal flammability standard to protect against the risk of upholstered furniture flammability, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2	This Act may be cited as the "Safer Occupancy Fur-
3	niture Flammability Act" or the "SOFFA Act".
4	SEC. 2. ADOPTION OF CALIFORNIA FLAMMABILITY STAND-
5	ARD AS A FEDERAL STANDARD.
6	(a) Definitions.—In this section—
7	(1) the term "bedding product" means—
8	(A) an item that is used for sleeping or
9	sleep-related purposes; or
10	(B) any component or accessory with re-
11	spect to an item described in subparagraph (A),
12	without regard to whether the component or ac-
13	cessory, as applicable, is used—
14	(i) alone; or
15	(ii) along with, or contained within,
16	that item;
17	(2) the term "California standard" means the
18	standard set forth by the Bureau of Electronic and
19	Appliance Repair, Home Furnishings and Thermal
20	Insulation of the Department of Consumer Affairs of
21	the State of California in Technical Bulletin 117-
22	2013, entitled "Requirements, Test Procedure and
23	Apparatus for Testing the Smolder Resistance of
24	Materials Used in Upholstered Furniture", originally
25	published June 2013, as in effect on the date of en-
26	actment of this Act;

1	(3) the terms "foundation" and "mattress"
2	have the meanings given those terms in section
3	1633.2 of title 16, Code of Federal Regulations, as
4	in effect on the date of enactment of this Act; and
5	(4) the term "upholstered furniture"—
6	(A) means an article of seating furniture
7	that—
8	(i) is intended for indoor use;
9	(ii) is movable or stationary;
10	(iii) is constructed with a contiguous
11	upholstered
12	(I) seat; and
13	(II)(aa) back; or
14	(bb) arm;
15	(iii) is constructed with an upholstered
16	seat, back, or arm;
17	(iv) is—
18	(I) made or sold with a cushion
19	or pillow, without regard to whether
20	that cushion or pillow, as applicable,
21	is attached or detached with respect
22	to the article of furniture; or
23	(II) stuffed or filled, or able to be
24	stuffed or filled, in whole or in part,
25	with any material, including a sub-

1	stance or material that is hidden or
2	concealed by fabric or another cov-
3	ering, including a cushion or pillow
4	belonging to, or forming a part of, the
5	article of furniture; and
6	(v) together with the structural units
7	of the article of furniture, any filling mate-
8	rial, and the container and covering with
9	respect to those structural units and that
10	filling material, can be used as a support
11	for the body of an individual, or the limbs
12	and feet of an individual, when the indi-
13	vidual sits in an upright or reclining posi-
14	tion;
15	(B) includes an article of furniture that is
16	intended for use by a child; and
17	(C) does not include—
18	(i) a mattress;
19	(ii) a foundation;
20	(iii) any bedding product; or
21	(iv) furniture that is used exclusively
22	for the purpose of physical fitness and ex-
23	ercise.
24	(b) Adoption of Standard.—

- 1 (1) IN GENERAL.—Beginning on the date that
 2 is 180 days after the date of enactment of this Act,
 3 and except as provided in paragraph (2), the Cali4 fornia standard shall be considered to be a flamma5 bility standard promulgated by the Consumer Prod6 uct Safety Commission under section 4 of the Flam7 mable Fabrics Act (15 U.S.C. 1193).
 - (2) Testing and Certification.—A fabric, related material, or product to which the California standard applies as a result of paragraph (1) shall not be subject to section 14(a) of the Consumer Product Safety Act (15 U.S.C. 2063(a)) with respect to that standard.
 - (3) CERTIFICATION LABEL.—Each manufacturer of a product that is subject to the California standard as a result of paragraph (1) shall include the statement "Complies with U.S. CPSC requirements for upholstered furniture flammability" on a permanent label located on the product, which shall be considered to be a certification that the product complies with that standard.

(c) Preemption.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding section 16 of the Flammable Fabrics Act (15 U.S.C. 1203) and section 231 of the Consumer Product Safety Im-

provement Act of 2008 (15 U.S.C. 2051 note), and 1 2 except as provided in subparagraphs (B) and (C) of 3 paragraph (2), no State or any political subdivision of a State may establish or continue in effect any 5 provision of a flammability law, regulation, code, 6 standard, or requirement that is designed to protect 7 against the risk of occurrence of fire, or to slow or 8 prevent the spread of fire, with respect to uphol-9 stered furniture. 10

- (2) Preservation of Certain State Law.—
 Nothing in this Act or the Flammable Fabrics Act
 (15 U.S.C. 1191 et seq.) may be construed to preempt or otherwise affect—
 - (A) any State or local law, regulation, code, standard, or requirement that—
 - (i) concerns health risks associated with upholstered furniture; and
 - (ii) is not designed to protect against the risk of occurrence of fire, or to slow or prevent the spread of fire, with respect to upholstered furniture;
 - (B) sections 1374 through 1374.3 of title 4, California Code of Regulations (except for subsections (b) and (c) of section 1374 of that

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1	title), as in effect on the date of enactment of
2	this Act; or
3	(C) the California standard.

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
