# A BILL

To express United States support for Taiwan's diplomatic alliances around the world.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Taiwan Allies Inter-
- 5 national Protection and Enhancement Initiative (TAIPEI)
- 6 Act of 2019".

### 1 SEC. 2. DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS WITH TAIWAN.

2	(a) FINDINGS.—Congress makes the following find-
3	<del>ings:</del>
4	(1) The Taiwan Relations Act of 1979 (Public
5	Law 96-8) states that it is the policy of the United
6	States "to preserve and promote extensive, close,
7	and friendly commercial, cultural, and other rela-
8	tions between the people of the United States and
9	the people on Taiwan".
10	(2) The Taiwan Relations Act of 1979 states
11	that it is the policy of the United States "to main-
12	tain the capacity of the United States to resist any
13	resort to force or other forms of coercion that would
14	jeopardize the security, or the social or economic
15	system, of the people on Taiwan".
16	(3) Taiwan is a free, democratic, and pros-
17	perous nation of 23,000,000 people and an impor-
18	tant contributor to peace and stability around the
19	world.
20	(4) Since the election of President Tsai Ing-wen
21	as President of Taiwan in 2016, the Government of
22	the People's Republic of China has intensified its ef-
23	forts to pressure Taiwan.
24	(5) Since 2016, the Gambia, Sao Tome and
25	Principe, Panama, the Dominican Republic, Burkina
26	Faso, and El Salvador have severed diplomatic rela-

1	tions with Taiwan in favor of diplomatic relations
2	with China.
3	(6) Taiwan currently maintains full diplomatic
4	relations with 17 nations around the world.
5	(7) According to President Tsai Ing-wen, the
6	severance of diplomatic ties is "part of a series of
7	diplomatic and military acts of coercion".
8	(8) The Asia Reassurance Initiative Act of
9	2018 (Public Law 115-409) states that—
10	(A) it is United States policy "to support
11	the close economic, political, and security rela-
12	tionship between Taiwan and the United
13	States'; and
14	(B) the President should—
15	(i) "conduct regular transfers of de-
16	fense articles to Taiwan that are tailored
17	to meet the existing and likely future
18	threats from the People's Republic of
19	China, including supporting the efforts of
20	Taiwan to develop and integrate asym-
21	metric capabilities, as appropriate, includ-
22	ing mobile, survivable, and cost-effective
23	capabilities, into its military forces"; and

1	(ii) "encourage the travel of high-level
2	United States officials to Taiwan, in ac-
3	cordance with the Taiwan Travel Act".
4	SEC. 3. REPORT ON UNITED STATES STRATEGY REGARD-
5	ING TAIWAN'S INTERNATIONAL RECOGNI-
6	TION.
7	(a) In General.—Not later than 90 days after the
8	date of the enactment of this Act, and every 180 days
9	thereafter, the Secretary of State or a designee of the Sec-
10	retary shall submit to the appropriate congressional com-
11	mittees a report on actions taken by the United States
12	to reaffirm and strengthen Taiwan's international alli-
13	ances around the world.
14	(b) Elements.—Each report required by subsection
15	(a) shall include the following elements:
16	(1) A description of the actions taken by the
17	Secretary of State, or designees of the Secretary, ef-
18	feetive May 20, 2016, to consult with governments
19	around the world, including the governments that
20	maintain official diplomatic relations with Taiwan,
21	with the purpose of inducing those governments to
22	maintain official diplomatic relations with Taiwan or
23	otherwise strengthen unofficial relations with Tai-
24	<del>wan.</del>

1	(2) An enumeration of specific countries of con-
2	eern, if any, and a description of the actions taken,
3	or actions anticipated, by those governments, com-
4	mencing May 20, 2016, to alter the formal diplo-
5	matic ties with Taiwan or to otherwise downgrade
6	official or unofficial relations.
7	(3) A plan of action to engage with the govern-
8	ments of the countries identified in paragraphs (1)
9	and (2) and increase cooperation with respect to
10	<del>Taiwan.</del>
11	(e) Form of Report.—Each report required by sub-
12	section (a) shall be submitted in unclassified form but may
13	include a classified annex.

16	SEC. 3. STRENGTHENING OF OFFICIAL OR UNOFFICIAL
17	TIES WITH TAIWAN.
18	(a) Sense of Congress.—It is the sense of Congress
19	that the United States Government should—
20	(1) support Taiwan in strengthening its official
21	diplomatic relationships as well as unofficial partner-
22	ships with countries in the Indo-Pacific region and
23	around the world;
24	(2) consider, in certain cases as appropriate and
25	in alignment with United States interests, increasing

1	its economic, security, and diplomatic engagement
2	with nations that have demonstrably strengthened, en-
3	hanced, or upgraded relations with Taiwan; and
4	(3) consider, in certain cases as appropriate and
5	in alignment with United States interests, reducing
6	its economic, security, and diplomatic engagement
7	with nations that take serious or significant actions
8	to undermine Taiwan.
9	(b) Consultation.—Not less than 30 days before in-
10	creasing or decreasing the United States Government's eco-
11	nomic, security, or diplomatic engagement with another na-
12	tion as a result of an action taken by that nation to either
13	strengthen or undermine ties with Taiwan, the Secretary
14	of State shall consult with the appropriate congressional
15	committees with respect to the proposed United States ac-
16	tion or actions.
17	(c) Rule of Construction.—Nothing in this Act
18	shall be construed to supersede or otherwise alter obligations
19	to comply with the notification procedures applicable to re-
20	mrogramming nurguant to eastion 624A of the Foreign As

2	mutual economic benefit and that protects United States
