To provide emergency relief to youth, children, and families experiencing homelessness, in light of the health and economic consequences of COVID-19.

Ms. Murkowski (for herself, Mr. Manchin, Ms. Collins, Ms. Sinema, Mrs. Shaheen, Mr. Schatz, Ms. Hassan, Mr. Casey, Ms. Hirono, Mr. Kelly, and Mr. Sullivan) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions

A BILL

To provide emergency relief to youth, children, and families experiencing homelessness, in light of the health and economic consequences of COVID-19.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Emergency Family
- 5 Stabilization Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
- 7 In this Act:

- (1) Current acf grant or subgrant recipient" means an Indian Tribe, Tribal organization, Native Hawaiian organization, local educational agency, or a local public, private, or Indian nonprofit agency or organization (including culturally specific community-based and faith-based organizations) that, as of the date of application for a grant under section 3, is also receiving another grant or subgrant administered by the Administration for Children and Families.
 - (2) DIRECTOR.—The term "Director" means the Director of the Office of Community Services of the Department of Health and Human Services.

(3) Direct services.—

- (A) In general.—Except as provided in subparagraph (B), the term "direct services" does not include providing referrals or operating a coordinated entry system or homeless management information system, by itself.
- (B) Indian Tribes, Tribal Organizations, OR NATIVE HAWAHAN ORGANIZATIONS.—An Indian Tribe, Tribal organization, or Native Hawaiian organization that provides referrals or assists other service providers with

1	direct services shall be considered as providing
2	direct services for purposes of this Act.
3	(4) Family stabilization agency.—The
4	term "family stabilization agency" means—
5	(A) a current ACF grant or subgrant re-
6	cipient;
7	(B) an Indian Tribe or Tribal organiza-
8	tion;
9	(C) an urban Indian organization;
10	(D) a Native Hawaiian organization,
11	(E) a local educational agency; or
12	(F) a local public, private, or Indian non-
13	profit agency or organization (including com-
14	munity-based and faith-based organizations),
15	with expertise and demonstrated experience
16	providing direct services to one or more of the
17	following populations:
18	(i) Children experiencing homeless-
19	ness, including children under age 6.
20	(ii) Unaccompanied homeless youth
21	under the age of 18.
22	(iii) Unaccompanied homeless youth
23	between the ages of 18 and 25.

1	(iv) Pregnant women, and pregnant or
2	parenting youth, experiencing homeless-
3	ness.
4	(v) Families experiencing homeless-
5	ness.
6	(vi) Survivors of dating violence, do-
7	mestic violence, family violence, or traf-
8	ficking.
9	(5) Indian Tribe.—The term "Indian Tribe"
10	means an Indian tribe, as defined in section 4 of the
11	Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance
12	Act (25 U.S.C. 5304).
13	(6) NATIVE HAWAIIAN ORGANIZATION.—The
14	term "Native Hawaiian organization" has the mean-
15	ing given that term in section 6207 of the Elemen-
16	tary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20
17	U.S.C. 7517).
18	(7) Local Educational agency.—The term
19	"local educational agency" has the meaning given
20	the term in section 8101 of the Elementary and Sec-
21	ondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 7801).
22	(8) Rural.—The term "rural" means a unit of
23	local government with a population of less than
24	50,000.

1	(9) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
2	the Secretary of Health and Human Services.
3	(10) Tribal organization.—The term "Trib-
4	al organization" means a tribal organization, as de-
5	fined in section 4 of the Indian Self-Determination
6	and Education Assistance Act (25 U.S.C. 5304).
7	(11) Urban indian organization.—The term
8	"urban Indian organization" has the meaning given
9	the term "Urban Indian organization" in section 4
10	of the Indian Health Care Improvement Act (25
11	U.S.C. 1603).
12	(12) Youth, Child, or family experiencing
13	HOMELESSNESS.—The term "youth, child, or family
14	experiencing homelessness' means—
15	(A) a homeless child or youth, as defined
16	in section 725(2) of the McKinney-Vento
17	Homeless Assistance Act (42 U.S.C.
18	11434a(2)), who is under the age of 25;
19	(B) an unaccompanied youth, as defined in
20	section 725(6) of the McKinney-Vento Home-
21	less Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 11434a(6)), who
22	is under the age of 25; or
23	(C) a household of not less than 2 people
24	that includes not less than 1 person under age
25	22 who is a homeless child or youth, as defined

in section 725(2) of the McKinney-Vento
Homeless Assistance Act (42 U.S.C.

11434a(2)).

4 SEC. 3. GRANTS TO FAMILY STABILIZATION AGENCIES.

(a) Grant Program Authorized.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—From amounts made available under section 4 and not reserved under subsection (b), the Secretary, acting through the Director, shall, on a competitive basis in accordance with subsection (d), award grants to family stabilization agencies (including current ACF grant or subgrant recipients and entities that have not previously received grants from the Administration for Children and Families) to enable the family stabilization agencies to carry out the activities described in subsection (e).

(2) Distribution timing.—

(A) CURRENT ACF GRANT OR SUBGRANT RECIPIENTS.—The Secretary shall award grants under this section, in accordance with subsection (d), to family stabilization agencies that are current ACF grant or subgrant recipients by not later than the date that is 45 days after the date of enactment of this Act.

1	(B) Additional grantees.—The Sec-
2	retary shall award grants under this section, in
3	accordance with subsection (d), to family sta-
4	bilization agencies that are not current ACF
5	grant or subgrant recipients by not later than
6	the date that is 130 days after the date of en-
7	actment of this Act.
8	(3) DISSEMINATION OF APPLICATIONS.—The
9	Secretary shall—
10	(A) ensure the application for grants under
11	this Act is broadly disseminated, including
12	through public posting on the website of the
13	Administration for Children and Families and
14	sharing with current ACF grant or subgrant re-
15	cipients; and
16	(B) make special dissemination efforts to
17	rural areas and among Indian Tribes, Tribal
18	organizations, and Native Hawaiian organiza-
19	tions.
20	(b) Reservation.—The Secretary shall reserve not
21	less than 1 percent and not more than 1.5 percent of the
22	amount appropriated under this Act to be used for admin-
23	istration, oversight, and technical assistance activities
24	through the Administration for Children and Families.

- 1 (c) APPLICATION.—A family stabilization agency that
- 2 desires to receive a grant under this Act shall submit an
- 3 application to the Secretary at such time, in such manner,
- 4 and containing or accompanied by such information as the
- 5 Secretary may reasonably require. Such application shall
- 6 include the following:
- 7 (1) A description of the housing, education,
- 8 health, mental and behavioral health, employment,
- 9 and other needs of youth, children, and families ex-
- periencing homelessness, in the area served by such
- agency, specifically including youth, children, and
- families who are sharing the housing of other per-
- sons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or
- 14 a similar reason.
- 15 (2) Available data on the extent of youth, child,
- and family homelessness in the area served by such
- agency, including data available from local edu-
- 18 cational agencies and data on child poverty in the
- 19 area.
- 20 (3) A description of barriers youth, children,
- and families experiencing homelessness face in ac-
- cessing services, including barriers related to dating
- violence, domestic violence, family violence, poverty,
- lack of employment, lack of transportation, lack of

- telephone and internet connectivity, educational
 needs, and language accessibility.
- 4 (4) A description of such agency's direct service 4 expertise and experience with youth, child, or family 5 homelessness, specifically including youth, children, 6 and families who are sharing the housing of other 7 persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, 8 or a similar reason.
 - (5) A description of the area served by such agency, including whether the service area is urban, suburban, rural, or Tribal. If the applicant claims to cover a Tribal service area but is not an Indian Tribe or Tribal organization, the applicant shall provide evidence of having consulted with the Indian Tribe or Tribal organization whose service area the applicant claims to cover and provide proof that the Indian Tribe or Tribal organization supports the applicant's application.
 - (6) A description of such agency's existing partnerships with other agencies or organizations with experience serving youth, children, and families experiencing homelessness.
 - (7) A description of how funds received under the grant will be used to provide emergency relief to

1	youth, children, and families experiencing homeless-
2	ness, specifically including—
3	(A) youth, children, and families who are
4	sharing the housing of other persons due to loss
5	of housing, economic hardship, or a similar rea-
6	son; and
7	(B) youth, children, and families experi-
8	encing homelessness who are not receiving serv-
9	ices through the Continuum of Care program
10	under subpart C of title IV of the McKinney-
11	Vento Homeless Assistance Act (42 U.S.C.
12	11381 et seq.) as of the date of the application.
13	(d) Award Basis.—
14	(1) In General.—The Secretary shall award
15	grants under this section on the basis of—
16	(A) the need in the area served by each ap-
17	plicant;
18	(B) the quality of each application; and
19	(C) the distribution and priority require-
20	ments under paragraphs (4) and (5).
21	(2) Need.—In determining need under para-
22	graph (1)(A), the Secretary shall consider—
23	(A) the extent of children, youth, and fam-
24	ilies experiencing homelessness in the area
25	served by the family stabilization agency, in-

cluding data available from local educational agencies and data on child poverty;

- (B) the extent to which the proposed uses of funds will provide emergency relief to meet unmet needs of youth, children, and families experiencing homelessness, specifically including youth, children, and families who are sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason;
- (C) the extent to which the proposed uses of funds will provide emergency relief to youth, children, and families experiencing homelessness who are not currently receiving services through the Continuum of Care program under subpart C of title IV of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 11381 et seq.); and
- (D) the extent to which the application addresses the particular needs of pregnant women, pregnant and parenting youth, Indian or Native Hawaiian women, children under age 6, children with disabilities, families experiencing domestic violence, survivors of sexual assault or human trafficking, or historically

1	marginalized and underserved communities of
2	color.
3	(3) Quality.—In determining quality under
4	paragraph (1)(B), the Secretary shall consider, for
5	both current ACF grant or subgrant recipients and
6	not current ACF grant or subgrant recipients, the
7	following:
8	(A) The family stabilization agency's needs
9	assessment under subsection $(c)(1)$ and the
10	likelihood that the program presented in the ap-
11	plication will meet such needs.
12	(B) The types, intensity, and coordination
13	of the emergency relief to be provided under the
14	program to youth, children, and families experi-
15	encing homelessness.
16	(C) The extent of the family stabilization
17	agency's demonstrated expertise and experience
18	providing direct services to youth, children, and
19	families experiencing homelessness who are
20	sharing the housing of other persons due to loss
21	of housing, economic hardship, or a similar rea-
22	son.
23	(D) The robustness of such agency's plan
24	to reach youth, children, and families experi-

encing homelessness who are sharing the hous-

- ing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason, including those who have lost a caregiver or family member to COVID-19.
 - (E) The extent of such agency's demonstrated expertise and experience in providing direct services to youth, children, and families experiencing homelessness specifically.
 - (F) The extent to which the program presented in the application represents a multigenerational approach to supporting youth, children, and families experiencing homelessness.
 - (G) The extent to which the application reflects coordination with local educational agencies and public or private nonprofit agencies or organizations with experience serving youth, children, and families experiencing homelessness.
 - (H) The extent to which the family stabilization agency is, has been, or has specific plans to partner with, a recipient of a grant or subgrant administered by the Administration for Children and Families.
- 24 (4) Distribution of Awards.—

1	(A) DISTRIBUTION AMONG TYPES OF COM-
2	MUNITIES.—In awarding grants under sub-
3	section (a), the Secretary shall ensure that
4	funds are distributed according to the following
5	allocation percentages:
6	(i) Not less than 10 percent of the
7	funds available for grants under this sec-
8	tion shall be awarded to family stabiliza-
9	tion agencies that are Indian Tribes, Trib-
10	al organizations, or Native Hawaiian orga-
11	nizations serving youth, children, and fami-
12	lies experiencing homelessness.
13	(ii) Not less than 36 percent of the
14	funds available for grants under this Act
15	shall be awarded to family stabilization
16	agencies serving predominantly rural areas.
17	(iii) Not less than 30 percent of the
18	funds available for grants under this Act
19	shall be awarded to family stabilization
20	agencies serving predominantly suburban
21	areas.
22	(iv) Not more than 24 percent of the
23	funds available for grants under this Act
24	shall be awarded to family stabilization

1	agencies serving predominantly urban
2	areas.
3	(B) Distribution to experienced
4	GRANTEES.—In awarding grants under sub-
5	section (a), the Secretary shall ensure that—
6	(i) 80 percent of the funds available
7	for grants under this section are distrib-
8	uted to family stabilization agencies—
9	(I) that are current ACF grant
10	or subgrant recipients; and
11	(II) which may apply in partner-
12	ship with local educational agencies,
13	Tribal educational agencies, public
14	housing agencies, tribally designated
15	housing entities, community develop-
16	ment financial institutions, State
17	housing finance agencies, programs
18	that provide shelter to youth experi-
19	encing homelessness who are pregnant
20	or parenting, public health agencies,
21	domestic violence, dating violence, and
22	family violence organizations, institu-
23	tions of higher education as defined in
24	section 101 of the Higher Education
25	Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1001). Native

1	Hawaiian organizations, urban Indian
2	organizations, or other community
3	partners; and
4	(ii) 20 percent of the funds are dis-
5	tributed as grants to family stabilization
6	agencies that are not current ACF grant
7	or subgrant recipients.
8	(C) Special exception for grants to
9	INDIAN TRIBES, TRIBAL ORGANIZATIONS, OR
10	NATIVE HAWAIIAN ORGANIZATIONS.—
11	(i) In general.—In awarding grants
12	to family stabilization agencies that are In-
13	dian Tribes, Tribal organizations, or Na-
14	tive Hawaiian organizations pursuant to
15	subparagraph (A)(i), the Secretary may
16	waive any requirements of paragraph (2)
17	or (3) or subsection (c).
18	(ii) Additional considerations.—
19	In awarding grants pursuant to subpara-
20	graph (A)(i), the Secretary shall consider
21	family stabilization agencies that are In-
22	dian Tribes, Tribal organizations, or Na-
23	tive Hawaiian organizations that provide
24	services that address child abuse and ne-
25	$\mathbf{glect}.$

- 1 (5) Priority in Awards.—In awarding grants 2 under paragraph (1), the Secretary shall give pri-3 ority to applications that will provide emergency re-4 lief to youth, children, and families experiencing 5 homelessness who are sharing the housing of other 6 persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, 7 or a similar reason, while ensuring the distribution 8 of awards in accordance with paragraph (4).
- 9 (e) AUTHORIZED ACTIVITIES.—Family stabilization 10 agencies may use funds awarded under this section to pro-11 vide emergency relief to youth, children, and families expe-12 riencing homelessness, including the following:
 - (1) The provision of personnel necessary to provide emergency relief and ensure services, resources, and assistance reach youth, children, and families experiencing homelessness, whether such personnel are employees of the family stabilization agency or a nonprofit community partner.
 - (2) The provision of personal protective equipment, hygiene supplies, and other supplies determined to be necessary to mitigate the spread of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID–19) by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, a State, an Indian Tribe, Tribal organization, or Native Ha-

1	waiian organization, or a locality for personnel deliv-
2	ering services and for youth, children, and families
3	experiencing homelessness.
4	(3) Payments to meet shelter and housing-re-
5	lated needs to support safety and health, including
6	payments for—
7	(A) security deposits;
8	(B) eviction prevention;
9	(C) utility connection fees and payments;
10	(D) outstanding rental, utility, motel, and
11	other bills as needed to enter housing or con-
12	nect utilities;
13	(E) motel or hotel stays;
14	(F) housing placement;
15	(G) records expungement; and
16	(H) other assistance.
17	(4) The provision of food and equipment needed
18	to prepare food.
19	(5) The provision of medical and dental health
20	services, including preventive care.
21	(6) The provision of mental and behavioral
22	health services, including preventive care.
23	(7) The provision of clothing, access to laundry
24	facilities, clothes washers and dryers, detergent, and
25	personal hygiene supplies.

- (8) The provision of transportation, including payments for gas, emergency vehicle repairs, required insurance, driver's education and driver's license fees, public transportation, and other transportation appropriate for Tribal and rural locations.
 - (9) The provision of support to meet communications and connectivity needs, including internet connectivity, outstanding internet or telephone bills as needed to connect communications services, electronic and connected devices, hotspots, portable chargers, pre-paid phone cards, calling minutes and data plans, and costs to ship items and supplies.
 - (10) The provision of support to meet educational and employment needs, including academic support, distance learning support, resources, and access, child care, social and emotional supports, career and technical education, employment training and placement, and similar supports.
 - (11) The purchase and distribution of store cards, gift cards, prepaid debit cards, and vouchers to allow youth, children, and families experiencing homelessness to purchase any items or services that constitute emergency relief.
- (12) The provision of mentorship and service coordination.

- 1 (13) The provision of services and supports to 2 meet the particular needs of pregnant women, preg-3 nant and parenting youth, and children birth to age 4 five, experiencing homelessness.
 - (14) The provision of services and supports to meet the particular needs of unaccompanied youth experiencing homelessness.
 - (15) The provision of services and supports to meet the particular needs of survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, or trafficking.
 - (16) The provision of assistance in accessing advance refunds payable under section 6428(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (commonly referred to as "economic impact payments"), unemployment compensation, and other benefits provided by Federal, State and local governments.
 - (17) The provision of services and supports to prevent and respond to child abuse and neglect.
 - (18) The provision of other extraordinary or emergency assistance needed to promote the safety and self-sufficiency of youth, children, and families experiencing homelessness.
- 23 (19) Other purposes as determined by the Sec-24 retary.
