## H. R. 5872

To amend title 10, United States Code, to establish a separation oath for members of the Armed Forces who are separating from military service.

## A BILL

To amend title 10, United States Code, to establish a separation oath for members of the Armed Forces who are separating from military service.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Oath of Exit Act".
- 5 SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT OF SEPARATION OATH FOR MEM-
- 6 BERS OF THE ARMED FORCES.
- 7 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress makes the following find-
- 8 ings:

- 1 (1) The United States Armed Forces is the 2 largest, all-volunteer military force in the world, yet 3 less than one percent of the American population 4 serves in the Armed Forces.
  - (2) Each branch of the Armed Forces (Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Coast Guard) instills in its members a sense of duty and obligation to the United States, their branch of service, and their comrades-in-arms.
    - (3) The Department of Veterans Affairs estimates that approximately 20 veterans of the Armed Forces commit suicide each day and a veteran's risk of suicide is 21 percent higher compared to an adult who has not served in the Armed Forces.
    - (4) The Department of Veterans Affairs is aggressively undertaking measures to prevent these tragic outcomes, yet suicide rates among veterans remain unacceptably high.
    - (5) Upon enlistment or appointment in the Armed Forces, a new member is obligated to take an oath of office or oath of enlistment.
  - (6) Most members of the Armed Forces view this oath not as an imposition, but as a promise that they are bound to fulfill.

1 (b) Establishment of Separation Oath.—Sec-2 tion 502 of title 10, United States Code, is amended— 3 (1) by redesignating subsection (b) as sub-4 section (c) and, in such subsection, by striking "The oath" and inserting "An oath established by this 5 6 section"; and 7 (2) by inserting after subsection (a) the fol-8 lowing new subsection (b): 9 "(b) Separation Oath.—Prior to retirement or 10 other separation from the armed forces, other than separation pursuant to the sentence of a court-martial, a mem-11 ber of an armed force may take the following oath: "I, recognizing that my 13 14 oath to support and defend the Constitution of the 15 United States against all enemies, foreign and do-16 mestic, has involved me and my fellow members in 17 experiences that few persons, other than our peers, 18 can understand, do solemnly swear (or affirm) to 19 continue to be the keeper of my brothers- and sis-20 ters-in-arms and protector of the United States and 21 the Constitution; to preserve the values I have 22 learned; to maintain my body and my mind; to give 23 help to, and seek help from, my fellow veterans; and 24 to not bring harm to myself or others. I take this

1	oath freely and without purpose of evasion, so help
2	me God.'".
