A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Primary and Secondary Education – School Safety and Student Well-Being –**
3 **Examination of Policies**

4 FOR the purpose of altering the amount and uses of annual funding relating to school safety
5 to include the development of services to resolve student disputes through mediation
6 and repealing the requirement that a certain appropriation be used for a certain
7 purpose; requiring the Maryland Center for School Safety, the State Department of
8 Education, and the Interagency Commission on School Construction jointly to review
9 and promulgate guidelines on the state of physical security in schools; requiring the
10 Maryland Center for School Safety to contract with an independent third party to
11 ensure that the Maryland Center for School Safety is adequately performing its
12 functions and duties; requiring the Department, in consultation with the Maryland
13 Center for School Safety and the Maryland Longitudinal Data Systems Center, to
14 analyze policies on school safety and student well-being during a certain period of
15 time; and generally relating to the safety and well-being of students in public
16 schools.

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

Article – Education

7–1502.

(a) There is a Maryland Center for School Safety.

(g) The Center shall perform the following functions and duties:

(1) Provide technical assistance and consultation to local school systems, State and local government, and community organizations on best practices for safe schools and violence prevention;

(2) Develop a website containing a searchable database of definitive research, books, videos, white papers, speakers, websites, and other school safety resources;

(3) Develop criteria that may be applied consistently and uniformly in local school systems for coding unsafe incidents and serious or violent offenses;

(4) Research and recommend the use of common assessment tools to be used to identify specific problems and needs of schools and neighborhoods to facilitate intervention before assessed findings become problematic;

(5) Assist local school systems to conduct a thorough assessment of their school safety data, school building layouts, and use of human resources for monitoring purposes to determine the need for:

(i) Surveillance and other security technology; and

(ii) Innovations to maximize the use of human resources to monitor activity and influence positive relationship building;

(6) Maintain and maximize relationships with emergency responders, law enforcement personnel, parents, and other emergency preparedness stakeholders to ensure seamless execution in an emergency event, including:

(i) Consolidate resources among stakeholders to maximize support and secure necessary skills to ensure emergency plan implementation;

(ii) Conduct collaborative training and preparation exercises; and

(iii) Identify improvements and ensure nonduplication of effort in emergency response procedures;

(7) Provide safety information on traveling to and from school to parents and students twice a year that includes data related to bus and pedestrian safety, strategies for ensuring personal safety, efforts of the local school system or school to improve safety, and information on the available options for reporting incidents or concerns;

(8) Utilize and update an existing clearinghouse of law enforcement resources that are available to support school safety to ensure that it includes information regarding the purpose and process for accessing available funding;

(9) Assist local school systems to improve and monitor traffic control measures in the immediate vicinity of schools to reduce the potential for pedestrian and vehicle accidents;

(10) Assist the Department to evaluate and update current data systems to ensure they are best suited for providing useful information on school safety issues;

(11) Assist local school systems to monitor local school system and individual school behavior data to ensure fairness in the application of consequences for student misbehavior;

(12) Assist the Department and local school systems:

(i) To prepare an annual report that combines multiple school safety data systems into one format for public review; and

(ii) To incorporate new data points into existing data collection systems;

(13) Assist in the development of safety and security criteria for the design and operation of school facilities;

(14) Assist local school systems to identify resources and implement training for students and parents about relationship violence, identifying the signs of unhealthy relationships, and preventing relationship violence;

(15) Provide technical assistance to local school systems in the review of safety and security audits and the implementation of improvements in school facilities;

(16) Analyze data on school resource officers and develop guidelines and training for local school systems as required under § 7–1508 of this subtitle;

(17) Certify school safety coordinators as required under § 7–1508 of this subtitle;

(18) Submit to the General Assembly and the Governor a summary of reports on school resource officer and local law enforcement agency coverage in public schools as required under § 7–1508 of this subtitle;

(19) Consult with local school systems on safety evaluations developed under § 7–1510 of this subtitle;

(20) Review and comment on school emergency plans developed under § 7–1510 of this subtitle; and

(21) Report to the General Assembly and the Governor on life-threatening incidents as required under § 7–1510 of this subtitle.

7–1508.

(g) (1) For [fiscal year 2020 and each fiscal year thereafter] **EACH OF FISCAL YEARS 2020 THROUGH 2024**, the Governor shall include in the annual budget bill an appropriation of \$10,000,000 to the Fund for the purpose of providing grants to local school systems and local law enforcement agencies to assist in meeting the requirements of subsection (e) of this section.

(2) Grants provided under this subsection shall be made to each local school system based on the number of schools in each school system in proportion to the total number of public schools in the State in the prior year.

7–1510.

(a) On or before June 15, 2019, and regularly thereafter, each local school system shall conduct a safety evaluation of each public school under the local school system's jurisdiction to:

(1) Identify and, if necessary, develop solutions for physical safety concerns, including issues with building security; and

(2) Identify and evaluate any patterns of safety concerns on school property or at school-sponsored events.

(b) In performing the safety evaluations, each designated safety coordinator shall:

(1) Consult with the Center for guidance;

(2) Coordinate with the Interagency Commission on School Construction's facility assessment process, established under § 5–310 of this article in identifying issues with public school facilities that could impact school safety; and

(3) Submit a summary of the completed safety evaluations to the Center.

(c) On or before December 1, 2019, the Department, in consultation with the Center and local school systems, shall update the Emergency Planning Guidelines for Local

School Systems and Schools to accommodate the findings made in the initial safety evaluations under subsection (a) of this section.

(d) On or before August 1, 2020, and regularly thereafter, each local school system shall update the school emergency plan for each public school in the school system's jurisdiction to:

(1) Include detailed plans for the manner in which each public school will address:

(i) Behavioral threats;

(ii) Emergency events; and

(iii) Accommodations for students with disabilities in emergency events;

(2) Conform with the Emergency Planning Guidelines updated under subsection (c) of this section; and

(3) Incorporate any changes required under subsection (f) of this section.

(e) Each local school system shall submit the plans updated under subsection (d) of this section to the Center for review and comment.

(f) (1) On or before August 1, 2020, and each August 1 thereafter, each local school system shall submit a report to the Center that includes, for the immediately preceding school year:

(i) Aggregate data about threats made against any school or school system facility;

(ii) Information about any school lockdowns, evacuations, or other emergency responses that occurred;

(iii) Incidents in which a public school's emergency plan failed in part or in whole to function as anticipated in an emergency or an emergency drill; and

(iv) School hours spent in an emergency or an emergency drill.

(2) Each local school system shall, in consultation with the Center, update each emergency plan to correct weaknesses identified under paragraph (1) of this subsection **AND TO IMPLEMENT THE GUIDELINES ESTABLISHED UNDER SUBSECTION (H) OF THIS SECTION.**

(g) (1) Each local school system shall promptly inform the Center of any critical, life-threatening incidents that occur on school grounds.

(2) (i) After informing the Center under this subsection, a local school system shall host an after-action review and evaluation of lessons learned from the event.

(ii) The local school system shall invite the Center, local law enforcement agencies, and emergency responders to participate in the after-action review and evaluation required under this paragraph.

(iii) A local school system shall file a report on the after-action review and evaluation with the Center.

(3) (i) The Center shall report to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2-1257 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly within 45 days after a local school system has filed a report on the after-action review and evaluation under paragraph (2)(iii) of this subsection.

(ii) The Center shall include in the report filed under this paragraph:

1. Lessons learned from the life-threatening incident; and

2. Any recommendations for improving school safety.

(H) (1) ON OR BEFORE JULY 1, 2024, AND EVERY 2 YEARS THEREAFTER, THE CENTER, THE DEPARTMENT, AND THE INTERAGENCY COMMISSION ON SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION JOINTLY SHALL REVIEW THE STATE OF PHYSICAL SECURITY IN SCHOOLS AND THE EXISTING GUIDELINES ON SCHOOL SAFETY.

(2) IN PERFORMING THEIR JOINT REVIEW, THE CENTER, THE DEPARTMENT, AND THE INTERAGENCY COMMISSION ON SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION SHALL MAKE USE OF THE LOCAL SCHOOL SYSTEM REPORTS REQUIRED UNDER SUBSECTION (G)(1) AND (2) OF THIS SECTION.

(3) AFTER CONDUCTING THE JOINT REVIEW, THE CENTER, THE DEPARTMENT, AND THE INTERAGENCY COMMISSION ON SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION JOINTLY SHALL PROMULGATE GUIDELINES FOR SCHOOL SECURITY DESIGNED TO MAXIMIZE SCHOOL SAFETY AND MINIMIZE IMPEDIMENTS TO STUDENTS AND STAFF.

7-1512.

(a) There is a Safe Schools Fund.

(b) The purpose of the Fund is to provide grants to local school systems to enhance school safety.

(c) The Subcabinet shall administer the Fund.

(d) (1) The Fund is a special, nonlapsing fund that is not subject to § 7–302 of the State Finance and Procurement Article.

(2) The Treasurer shall hold the Fund separately and the Comptroller shall account for the Fund in conjunction with the Executive Director of the Center.

(e) The Fund consists of:

(1) Money credited to the Fund under § 17–106(e) of the Transportation Article;

(2) Money appropriated in the State budget to the Fund;

(3) Money appropriated to the Fund under § 7–1508 of this subtitle;

(4) **MONEY APPROPRIATED TO THE FUND UNDER SUBSECTION (F) OF THIS SECTION;**

(5) Money from any other source accepted for the benefit of the Fund; and

~~[(5)]~~ (6) Any interest earnings of the Fund.

(F) FOR FISCAL YEAR 2025 AND EACH FISCAL YEAR THEREAFTER, THE GOVERNOR SHALL INCLUDE IN THE ANNUAL BUDGET BILL AN APPROPRIATION OF \$20,000,000 TO THE FUND TO BE USED FOR THE PURPOSES DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (G) OF THIS SECTION.

~~[(f)]~~ (G) (1) Except as provided in ~~[subsection (g)]~~ **PARAGRAPH (2)** of this ~~[section]~~ **SUBSECTION, AND SUBJECT TO SUBSECTION (H) OF THIS SECTION**, the Fund may be used only to provide grants to local school systems to enhance school safety, including:

8 services;

9 **[(9)] (IX)** Providing information to students and parents on traveling
10 safely to and from school, including data related to bus and pedestrian safety, strategies
11 for ensuring personal safety, efforts of the local school system to improve safety, and
12 information on available options for reporting incidents and concerns; **[and]**

13 **[(10)] (X)** Assisting local school systems to improve and monitor traffic
14 control measures in the immediate vicinity of schools to reduce the potential for pedestrian
15 and vehicle accidents;

16 **(XI) PROVIDING GRANTS TO DEVELOP SERVICES FOR**
17 **RESOLVING STUDENT DISPUTES THROUGH A MEDIATION PROCESS; AND**

18 **(XII) GIVING GRANTS TO PROVIDE LOCAL SCHOOL SYSTEMS**
19 **WITH A SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER OR ADEQUATE LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT**
20 **COVERAGE IN ACCORDANCE WITH A LOCAL SCHOOL SYSTEM'S COVERAGE PLAN, AS**
21 **REQUIRED BY § 7-1508 OF THIS SUBTITLE.**

22 **(2) (I) FOR MONEY PROVIDED FROM THE FUND IN ACCORDANCE**
23 **WITH PARAGRAPH (1)(XII) OF THIS SUBSECTION, GRANTS SHALL BE MADE TO LOCAL**
24 **SCHOOL SYSTEMS AND LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES.**

25 **(II) IN AWARDING GRANTS IN ACCORDANCE WITH PARAGRAPH**
26 **(1)(XII) OF THIS SUBSECTION, THE SUBCABINET SHALL PROVIDE TO EACH COUNTY**
27 **FUNDING IN AN AMOUNT BASED ON THE NUMBER OF SCHOOLS IN THE COUNTY'S**
28 **PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM IN PROPORTION TO THE TOTAL NUMBER OF PUBLIC**
29 **SCHOOLS IN THE STATE IN THE PRIOR YEAR.**

30 **(III) MONEY PROVIDED FROM THE FUND IN ACCORDANCE WITH**
31 **THIS PARAGRAPH SHALL BE DISTRIBUTED TO LOCAL SCHOOL SYSTEMS AND LOCAL**
32 **LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES IN THE FOLLOWING AMOUNTS:**

1 **1. FOR EACH OF FISCAL YEARS 2020 THROUGH 2024,**
2 **\$10,000,000 OF THE MONEY IN THE FUND SHALL BE USED AS PROVIDED UNDER §**
3 **7-1508 OF THIS SUBTITLE; AND**

4 **2. FOR FISCAL YEAR 2025 AND EACH FISCAL YEAR**
5 **THEREAFTER, AN AMOUNT THAT THE SUBCABINET DETERMINES APPROPRIATE.**

6 [(g)] Beginning in fiscal year 2020 and each fiscal year thereafter, at least
7 \$10,000,000 of the money in the Fund shall be used to provide grants to local school systems
8 and local law enforcement agencies as provided under § 7-1508 of this subtitle.]

9 **(H) IN AWARDING GRANTS FROM THE FUND FOR THE PURPOSES**
10 **DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (G) OF THIS SECTION, THE SUBCABINET SHALL AWARD**
11 **GRANTS TO EACH LOCAL SCHOOL SYSTEM BASED ON THE NUMBER OF SCHOOLS IN**
12 **EACH SCHOOL SYSTEM IN PROPORTION TO THE TOTAL NUMBER OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS**
13 **IN THE STATE IN THE PRIOR YEAR.**

14 [(h)] **(I)** (1) The Subcabinet may make grants to local school systems and
15 local law enforcement agencies from the Fund.

16 (2) The Subcabinet shall establish procedures for local school systems and
17 local law enforcement agencies to apply for grants from the Fund.

18 [(i)] **(J)** (1) The State Treasurer shall invest the money of the Fund in the
19 same manner as other State money may be invested.

20 (2) Any interest earnings of the Fund shall be credited to the Fund.

21 [(j)] **(K)** Expenditures from the Fund may only be made:

22 (1) in accordance with the State budget; or

23 (2) by the budget amendment procedure as provided in § 7-209 of the State
24 Finance and Procurement Article, if at least 45 days have passed since the budget
25 amendment and supporting information were submitted to the budget committees for their
26 review and comment.

27 [(k)] **(L)** Money expended from the Fund by local school systems to enhance
28 school safety is supplemental to and is not intended to take the place of funding that
29 otherwise would be appropriated to local school systems.

30 **SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That:**

31 (a) On or before December 1, 2024, the Maryland Center for School Safety shall
32 contract with an independent third party to ensure that the Center is adequately

performing the functions and duties to which it is assigned under § 7–1502 of the Education Article.

(b) (1) On or before December 1, 2025, the independent third party shall provide the Center with its assessment.

(2) The independent third party's assessment shall include an in-depth analysis of each of the Center's functions and duties, any areas in which the Center is failing to achieve its functions and duties, and recommended changes necessary to achieve success.

(c) On or before January 15, 2026, the Center shall report the results of the independent third party's study to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1257 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly.

(d) The Governor shall include an appropriation of \$200,000 in the fiscal year 2025 budget to carry out the provisions of this section.

SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That:

(a) The State Department of Education, in consultation with the Maryland Center for School Safety and the Maryland Longitudinal Data Systems Center, shall provide an analysis of the effect State and local policies in place from the 2017–2018 school year through the 2022–2023 school year had on school safety and student well-being.

(b) The analysis shall make use of school data collected on:

- (1) bullying, harassment, or intimidation instances;
- (2) disciplinary actions taken against students;
- (3) school-based arrests of students;
- (4) behavioral threat assessments conducted in schools;
- (5) student drug overdoses and whether they were fatal;
- (6) the initiation of suicide prevention protocols for students and instances of student suicide; and
- (7) weapons recovered on school grounds.

(c) The analysis shall include, consistent with State and federal privacy law, information on the outcomes listed under subsection (b) of this section, disaggregated by:

- (1) the type of school involved in the incident;

(2) if applicable, a student's race;

(3) if applicable, a student's sex;

(4) if applicable, a student's gender; and

(5) if applicable, a student's ethnicity.

(d) The analysis shall examine which State and local policies improved student safety and well-being, as measured by the outcomes listed in subsection (b) of this section, and recommendations for reproducing or expanding those policies.

(e) On or before July 1, 2024, the Department shall report to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2-1257 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly on the results of its analysis.

SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 2023.
