Mrs. Carolyn B. Maloney of New York (for herself and Mr. Beyer) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Oversight and Reform, and in addition to the Committees on Financial Services, Ways and Means, the Judiciary, House Administration, and Energy and Commerce, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned

A BILL

To establish a commission to study how Federal laws and policies affect United States citizens living in foreign countries.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Commission on Ameri-
- 5 cans Living Abroad Act of 2019".

1 SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT.

- There is established a commission to be known as the
- 3 "Commission on Americans Living Abroad" (in this Act
- 4 referred to as the "Commission".

5 SEC. 3. MEMBERSHIP.

- 6 (a) Number and Appointment.—The Commission
- 7 shall be composed of 10 members appointed by the Presi-
- 8 dent, of whom—
- 9 (1) two members shall be appointed from
- among individuals recommended by the Speaker of
- the House of Representatives;
- 12 (2) two members shall be appointed from
- among individuals recommended by the minority
- leader of the House of Representatives;
- 15 (3) two members shall be appointed from
- among individuals recommended by the majority
- 17 leader of the Senate; and
- 18 (4) two members shall be appointed from
- among individuals recommended by the minority
- leader of the Senate.
- 21 (b) QUALIFICATIONS.—
- 22 (1) Limit on officers or employees of
- THE UNITED STATES.—Not more than 6 members
- shall be officers or employees of the United States.

1	(2) POLITICAL PARTY AFFILIATION.—Not more
2	than 6 members of the Commission may be of the
3	same political party.
4	(3) Expertise.—
5	(A) Officers or employees of the
6	UNITED STATES.—Members of the Commission
7	who are officers or employees of the United
8	States shall be appointed from among individ-
9	uals whose employment is directly related to the
10	matters to be studied by the Commission under
11	section $4(a)(2)$.
12	(B) Other members.—Members of the
13	Commission who are not officers or employees
14	of the United States shall be appointed from
15	among individuals who—
16	(i) have lived in a foreign country for
17	not less than one year;
18	(ii) are members of organizations that
19	represent United States citizens living in
20	foreign countries; or
21	(iii) have other experience that is rel-
22	evant to the matters to be studied by the
23	Commission under section $4(a)(2)$.
24	(c) Period of Appointment; Vacancies.—Mem-
25	bers shall be appointed for the life of the Commission. Any

1	vacancy in the Commission shall be filled in the same man-
2	ner in which the original appointment was made. Any va-
3	cancy in the Commission shall not affect its powers.
4	(d) First Meeting.—Not later than 60 days after
5	the date on which all members of the Commission have
6	been appointed, the Commission shall hold its first meet-
7	ing.
8	(e) Meetings.—The Commission shall meet at the
9	call of the Chairperson.
10	(f) QUORUM.—A majority of the members of the
11	Commission shall constitute a quorum, but a lesser num-
12	ber of members may hold hearings.
13	(g) Chairperson.—The President shall select a
14	Chairperson for the Commission from among its members.
15	SEC. 4. DUTIES.
16	(a) Study.—
17	(1) In General.—The Commission shall con-
18	duct a study on how Federal laws and policies affect
19	United States citizens living in foreign countries, in-
20	cluding civilians and members of the Armed Forces.
21	(2) Matters studied.—The matters studied
22	shall include the following:
23	(A) Federal financial reporting require-
24	ments for a United States citizen living in a
25	foreign country, including the requirements

under section 5314 of title 31, United States
Code.

- (B) Federal policies and requirements that affect the ability of a United States citizen living in a foreign country to access foreign and domestic financial institutions, including requirements under chapter 4 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (commonly known as the "Foreign Account Tax Compliance Act") and requirements affecting financial institutions imposed by the Uniting and Strengthening America by Providing Appropriate Tools Required to Intercept and Obstruct Terrorism Act of 2001 (USA Patriot Act) (Public Law 107–56).
- (C) Federal requirements for a spouse, child, or another family member of a United States citizen living in a foreign country who is not a United States citizen to become a United States citizen.
- (D) The ability of a United States citizen living in a foreign country to vote in Federal, State, and local elections in the United States, and the process for such a citizen to vote in such elections.

- 1 (E) The processes by which a United 2 States citizen living in a foreign country inter-3 acts with Federal programs such as Social Se-4 curity and Medicare.
 - (F) Which Federal agencies have jurisdiction over each Federal program that serves
 United States citizens who live in foreign countries and possible methods to improve the collaboration of and coordination between such Federal agencies.
- 11 (b) Consultation With Outside Organiza-12 tions.—In conducting the study under subsection (a), the 13 Commission shall consult with organizations that rep-14 resent United States citizens living in foreign countries.

(c) Reports.—

(1) Initial report.—Not later than one year after the date of enactment of this Act, the Commission shall submit a report to the President, Congress, and the head of any Federal agency identified in subsection (a)(2)(F), which shall contain a detailed statement of the findings and conclusions of the Commission, together with its recommendations for such legislative and administrative actions as it considers appropriate.

1 (2) UPDATE.—Not later than one year after the
2 date on which the Commission submits the report
3 under paragraph (1), the Commission shall submit
4 an update to the President, Congress, and the head
5 of any Federal agency identified in subsection
6 (a)(2)(F), which shall describe any administrative
7 actions taken by the head of any Federal agency
8 pursuant to the recommendations in such report.

9 SEC. 5. POWERS OF THE COMMISSION.

- 10 (a) Hearings and Sessions.—The Commission
- 11 may, for the purpose of carrying out this Act, hold hear-
- 12 ings, sit and act at times and places, take testimony, and
- 13 receive evidence as the Commission considers appropriate.
- 14 (b) Powers of Members and Agents.—Any mem-
- 15 ber or agent of the Commission may, if authorized by the
- 16 Commission, take any action which the Commission is au-
- 17 thorized to take by this section.
- 18 (c) Obtaining Official Data.—Subject to section
- 19 6103 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, the Commis-
- 20 sion may secure directly from any Federal department or
- 21 agency such information as the Commission considers nec-
- 22 essary to carry out this Act. Upon request of the Chair-
- 23 person of the Commission, the head of such department
- 24 or agency shall furnish such information to the Commis-
- 25 sion.

- 1 (d) Mails.—The Commission may use the United
- 2 States mails in the same manner and under the same con-
- 3 ditions as other departments and agencies of the United
- 4 States.

5 SEC. 6. COMMISSION PERSONNEL MATTERS.

- 6 (a) Compensation of Members.—Each member of
- 7 the Commission who is not an officer or employee of the
- 8 United States shall be compensated at a rate equal to the
- 9 daily equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay prescribed
- 10 for level IV of the Executive Schedule under section 5315
- 11 of title 5, United States Code, for each day (including
- 12 travel time) during which such member is engaged in the
- 13 performance of the duties of the Commission. All members
- 14 of the Commission who are officers or employees of the
- 15 United States shall serve without compensation in addi-
- 16 tion to that received for their services as officers or em-
- 17 ployees of the United States.
- 18 (b) Travel Expenses.—The members of the Com-
- 19 mission shall be allowed travel expenses, including per
- 20 diem in lieu of subsistence, at rates authorized for employ-
- 21 ees of agencies under subchapter I of chapter 57 of title
- 22 5, United States Code, while away from their homes or
- 23 regular places of business in the performance of services
- 24 for the Commission.
- 25 (c) Staff.—

- 1 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Chairperson of the
 2 Commission may, without regard to the civil service
 3 laws and regulations, appoint and terminate an exec4 utive director and such other additional personnel as
 5 may be necessary to enable the Commission to per6 form its duties. The employment of an executive di7 rector shall be subject to confirmation by the Commission.
- 9 (2) Compensation.—The Chairperson of the 10 Commission may fix the compensation of the execu-11 tive director and other personnel without regard to 12 chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of title 13 5, United States Code, relating to classification of 14 positions and General Schedule pay rates, except 15 that the rate of pay for the executive director and 16 other personnel may not exceed the rate payable for 17 level V of the Executive Schedule under section 5316 18 of such title.
- 19 (d) Detail of Government Employees.—Any 20 United States employee may be detailed to the Commis-21 sion without reimbursement, and such detail shall be with-22 out interruption or loss of civil service status or privilege.
- 23 (e) PROCUREMENT OF TEMPORARY AND INTERMIT-24 TENT SERVICES.—The Chairperson of the Commission 25 may procure temporary and intermittent services under

- 1 section 3109(b) of title 5, United States Code, at rates
- 2 for individuals that do not exceed the daily equivalent of
- 3 the annual rate of basic pay prescribed for level V of the
- 4 Executive Schedule under section 5316 of such title.

5 SEC. 7. FEDERAL AGENCY RESPONSE.

- 6 Not later than 180 days after the date on which the
- 7 Commission submits the report under section 4(c)(1), the
- 8 head of any Federal agency that is affected by a rec-
- 9 ommendation in such report shall submit to the President,
- 10 Congress, and the Commission a response to such rec-
- 11 ommendation, including any plans to take administrative
- 12 action pursuant to such recommendation.

13 SEC. 8. TERMINATION.

- 14 The Commission shall terminate on the date on which
- 15 it submits its update under section 4(c)(2).

16 SEC. 9. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

- There is authorized to be appropriated \$2,000,000
- 18 for each of fiscal years 2020 and 2021 to the Commission
- 19 to carry out this Act, to remain available until the termi-
- 20 nation of the Commission.
