1 AN ACT relating to automated external defibrillators in schools. 2 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky: 3 → Section 1. KRS 158.162 is amended to read as follows: 4 (1) As used in this section: "Emergency management response plan" or "emergency plan" means a 5 (a) 6 written document to prevent, mitigate, prepare for, respond to, and recover 7 from emergencies; and 8 (b) "First responders" means local fire, police, and emergency medical personnel. 9 (2) (a) Each local board of education shall require the school council or, if none 10 exists, the principal in each school building in its jurisdiction to adopt an 11 emergency plan to include procedures to be followed in case of fire, severe 12 weather, or earthquake, or if a building lockdown as defined in KRS 158.164 13 is required. 14 (b) Following adoption, the emergency plan, along with a diagram of the facility, 15 shall be provided to appropriate first responders. 16 (c) The emergency plan shall be reviewed following the end of each school year 17 by the school council, the principal, and first responders and shall be revised 18 as needed. 19 (d) The principal shall discuss the emergency plan with all school staff prior to 20 the first instructional day of each school year and shall document the time and 21 date of any discussion. 22 The emergency plan and diagram of the facility shall be excluded from the (e) 23 application of KRS 61.870 to 61.884. 24 Each local board of education shall require the school council or, if none exists, the (3) 25 principal in each school building to:

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Establish primary and secondary evacuation routes for all rooms located

within the school and shall post the routes in each room by any doorway used

2	(b)	Identify the best available severe weather safe zones, in consultation with
3		local and state safety officials and informed by guiding principles set forth by
4		the National Weather Service and the Federal Emergency Management
5		Agency, and post the location of safe zones in each room of the school;
6	(c)	Develop practices for students to follow during an earthquake; [and]
7	(d)	Develop and adhere to practices to control the access to each school building.
8		Practices shall include but not be limited to:
9		1. Controlling outside access to exterior doors during the school day;
10		2. Controlling the main entrance of the school with electronically locking
11		doors, a camera, and an intercom system;
12		3. Controlling access to individual classrooms;
13		4. Requiring classroom doors to be equipped with hardware that allows the
14		door to be locked from the outside but opened from the inside;
15		5. Requiring classroom doors to remain closed and locked during
16		instructional time, except:
17		a. In instances in which only one (1) student and one (1) adult are in
18		the classroom; or
19		b. When approved in writing by the state school security marshal;
20		6. Requiring classroom doors with windows to be equipped with material
21		to quickly cover the window during a building lockdown;
22		7. Requiring all visitors to report to the front office of the building, provide
23		valid identification, and state the purpose of the visit; and
24		8. Providing a visitor's badge to be visibly displayed on a visitor's outer
25		garment <u>; and</u>
26	<u>(e)</u>	Maintain a portable automated external defibrillator in a public, readily
27		accessible, well-marked location of every middle and high school building

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1		and at every school sanctioned event, practice, or athletic competition by
2		academic year 2025-2026 and:
3		1. Adopt procedures for the use of the portable automated external
4		defibrillator during an emergency;
5		2. Adopt policies for compliance with KRS 311.665 to 311.669 on
6		training, maintenance, notification, and communication with the local
7		emergency medical services system; and
8		3. Ensure that a minimum of three (3) employees in the school and all
9		interscholastic athletic coaches be trained on the use of a portable
10		automated external defibrillator in accordance with KRS 311.667.
11	(4)	All schools shall be in compliance with the provisions of subsection (3)(d) of this
12		section as soon as practicable but no later than July 1, 2022.
13	(5)	Each local board of education shall require the principal in each public school
14		building in its jurisdiction to conduct, at a minimum, emergency response drills to
15		include one (1) severe weather drill, one (1) earthquake drill, and one (1) lockdown
16		drill within the first thirty (30) instructional days of each school year and again
17		during the month of January. Required fire drills shall be conducted according to
18		administrative regulations promulgated by the Department of Housing, Buildings
19		and Construction. Whenever possible, first responders shall be invited to observe
20		emergency response drills.
21	(6)	No later than November 1 of each school year, a local district superintendent shall
22		send verification to the Kentucky Department of Education that all schools within
23		the district are in compliance with the requirements of this section.
24	(7)	A district with a school not in compliance with the requirements of subsection
25		(3)(d) of this section by July 1, 2022, shall not be eligible for approval by the
26		Kentucky Department of Education for new building construction or expansion in
27		the 2022-2023 school year and any subsequent year without verification of

6	(1)	The	General Assembly hereby finds that training Kentucky students in
7		card	iopulmonary resuscitation procedures will:
8		(a)	Increase students' ability to respond to emergency situations at school, home,
9			and public places;
10		(b)	Benefit Kentucky communities by rapidly increasing the number of people
11			ready to respond to sudden cardiac arrest, a leading cause of death in the
12			United States; and
13		(c)	Assist students in becoming responsible citizens consistent with the goals
14			established in KRS 158.6451.
15	(2)	Eve	ry public high school shall provide cardiopulmonary resuscitation training to
16		stud	ents as part of the health course or the physical education course that is required
17		for 1	high school graduation or the Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps course
18		that	meets the physical education requirement. The training shall:
19		(a)	Be based on the American Heart Association's Guidelines for CPR and

7	(1)	(a)	The Kentucky Board of Education or organization or agency designated by
8			the board to manage interscholastic athletics shall require each interscholastic
9			coach to complete a sports safety course consisting of training on how to
10			prevent common injuries. The content of the course shall include but not be
11			limited to emergency planning, heat and cold illnesses, emergency
12			recognition, head injuries including concussions, neck injuries, facial injuries,
13			cardiopulmonary resuscitation, use of a portable automated external
14			defibrillator in accordance with KRS 311.667, and principles of first aid. The
15			course shall also be focused on safety education and shall not include
16			coaching principles.
17		(b)	The state board or its agency shall:
18			1. Establish a minimum timeline for a coach to complete the course;
19			2. Approve providers of a sports safety course;
20			3. Be responsible for ensuring that an approved course is taught by
21			qualified professionals who shall either be athletic trainers, registered
22			nurses, physicians, or physician's assistants licensed to practice in

24			4. Establish the minimum qualifying score for successful course

27			and revised if needed.

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1	(d)	A course shall be able to be completed through hands-on or online teaching
2		methods in ten (10) clock hours or less.

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- (e) 1. A course shall include an end-of-course examination with a minimum qualifying score for successful course completion established by the board or its agency.
 - 2. All coaches shall be required to take the end-of-course examination and shall obtain at least the minimum qualifying score.
- (f) Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year, and each year thereafter, at least one (1) person who has completed the course shall be at every interscholastic athletic practice and competition.
- (2) (a) Beginning with the 2012-2013 school year, and each year thereafter, the state board or its agency shall require each interscholastic coach to complete training on how to recognize the symptoms of a concussion and how to seek proper medical treatment for a person suspected of having a concussion. The training shall be approved by the state board or its agency and may be included in the sports safety course required under subsection (1)(a) of this section.
 - (b) The board or its agency shall develop guidelines and other pertinent information or adopt materials produced by other agencies to inform and educate student athletes and their parents or legal guardians of the nature and risk of concussion and head injury, including the continuance of play after concussion or head injury. Any required physical examination and parental authorization shall include acknowledgement of the education information required under this paragraph.
 - (c) Upon request, the board or its agency shall make available to the public any training materials developed by the board or agency used to satisfy the requirements of paragraph (a) of this subsection. The board or its agency shall

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1 not be held liable for the use of any training materials so disseminated.

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(3) (a) A student athlete suspected by an interscholastic coach, school athletic personnel, or contest official of sustaining a concussion during an athletic practice or competition shall be removed from play at that time and shall not return to play prior to the ending of the practice or competition until the athlete is evaluated to determine if a concussion has occurred. The evaluation shall be completed by a physician or a licensed health care provider whose scope of practice and training includes the evaluation and management of concussions and other brain injuries. A student athlete shall not return to play on the date of a suspected concussion absent the required evaluation.

- (b) 1. Upon completion of the required evaluation, a coach:
 - May return a student athlete to play if the physician or licensed health care provider determines that no concussion has occurred;
 or
 - b. Shall not return a student athlete to play if the physician or licensed health care provider determines that a concussion has occurred.
 - 2. If no physician or licensed health care provider described in paragraph (a) of this subsection is present at the practice or competition to perform the required evaluation, a coach shall not return a student athlete to play who is suspected of sustaining a concussion. The student athlete shall not be allowed to participate in any subsequent practice or athletic competition unless written clearance from a physician is provided.
- (c) A student athlete deemed to be concussed shall not return to participate in any athletic practice or competition occurring on the day of the injury. The injured student athlete shall not be allowed to participate in any subsequent practice or athletic competition unless written clearance from a physician is provided.

26		<u>(b)</u>	The existence of a venue-specific emergency action plan that the school has

2	<u>(7)</u> [(5)]	Each school shall maintain complete and accurate records of its compliance
3		with this section and shall make the records available for review by the state
4		board or its agency upon request.
