5	their families have access to mental health treatment, including for post-
6	traumatic stress disorder, depression, suicide, and suicidal ideation.
7	(a) The department shall make mental health coverage services and treatment a
8	full focus stream of the veterans' benefits field representative program
9	described in Section 8 of this Act, and ensure that veterans' benefit field
10	representatives help identify all federal and other mental health benefits,
11	coverage, and services available to veterans and their families, including for
12	post-traumatic stress disorder, depression, and suicide prevention.
13	(b) The department shall develop and implement a strategy to reduce barriers to
14	access to mental health services and treatment for veterans and their
15	families in coordination with local, state, and federal governmental
16	agencies and in consultation with nonprofits, service providers including
17	Veterans Affairs medical centers and the United States Department of
18	Veterans Affairs, and localities and cities that have effective prevention and
19	treatment systems for mental health, including by:
20	1. Identifying structural and logistical barriers to accessing treatment,
21	including perceived stigma, long travel distances to receive care, and
22	any other barriers, and sending an annual report on such barriers
23	available to the Legislative Research Commission for referral to the
24	Interim Joint Committee on Veterans, Military Affairs, and Public
25	Protection, the Interim Joint Committee on Families and Children,
26	and the Interim Joint Committee on Health, and to the Office of the

1	2. Resolving all barriers taentified in the report required by

22	1. Identifying and applying for federal and private grants focused on

24	2. Coordinating local, state, federal, and nonprofit programs that include
25	community-based approaches for at-risk veterans and veterans at

27	3 Providing technical assistance to communities to develop strategic

1	plans to reduce veteran suicide, including through coordination and
2	participation by local leaders, faith communities, schools, workplaces,
3	and other stakeholders; and
4	4. Evaluating community strategic plans within Kentucky and
5	disseminating learnings and best practices to optimize the impact of
6	efforts by all partners and stakeholders.
7	(2) The department shall ensure that resources are available to veterans to assist in
8	connecting veterans to trained mental health care providers, including those
9	trained in veteran suicide prevention.
10	(a) The department shall create a centralized provider database, organized by
11	region, identifying mental health providers with expertise and ability to
12	assist veterans and their families which also identifies which mental health
13	providers have training or expertise in the prevention of veteran suicide and
14	treatment of veteran suicidal ideation.
15	(b) The department shall use existing resources and incorporate best practice
16	and research from the United States Department of Veterans Affairs and
17	state and nonprofit service providers in Kentucky to develop a continuing
18	education course for mental health providers in Kentucky to obtain
19	expertise in veteran suicide assessment, prevention, treatment, and risk
20	management.
21	(c) The department shall make the veteran suicide continuing education course
22	described in paragraph (b) of this subsection available for free to providers
23	in regions of the Commonwealth identified in paragraph (a) of this
24	subsection which lack a sufficient number of trained providers.
25	(d) The department shall use existing or appropriated resources to identify
26	evidence-based best practices to increase awareness of any veteran suicide
27	prevention hotline which provides services in-state and other crisis

1	resources with proven effectiveness to reduce veteran suicide.
2	→SECTION 11. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 40 IS CREATED TO
3	READ AS FOLLOWS:
4	The Kentucky Department of Veterans' Affairs shall create an initiative designed to
5	end veteran homelessness.
6	(1) As used in this section, "ending veteran homelessness" has the same meaning as
7	in the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness Criteria and
8	Benchmarks for Achieving the Goal of Ending Veteran Homelessness.
9	(2) The department shall develop and implement a strategy to meet the goal of ending
10	veteran homelessness within three (3) years of the effective date of this Act in
11	coordination with local, state, and federal government agencies and nonprofits,
12	and in consultation with states and cities that have achieved an end to veteran
13	homelessness in accordance with the criteria described in subsection (1) of this
14	section, including through:
15	(a) Coordinated community outreach and a common assessment tool;
16	(b) A community-wide, comprehensive list of veterans experiencing
17	homelessness, prioritized based on vulnerability;
18	(c) Data-sharing among all relevant providers, government agencies, and
19	Veterans Affairs Medical Centers;
20	(d) Increased coordination and streamlined processes for appropriate housing
21	placements;
22	(e) Connecting veterans experiencing homelessness to health, mental health,
23	employment, and training resources through the services described in this
24	section;
25	(f) A commitment to Housing First principles, as defined by the United States
26	Interagency Council on Homelessness; and
27	(g) Identification of and application for funding as needed.
