- 6 (9) Submits an annual report detailing its efforts to address student 7 hunger to the Commission.
- 8 (b) The Commission shall designate as a hunger-free campus any campus of a 2-year public institution of higher education that meets all of the requirements for 4-year public institutions of higher education or regional higher education centers identified in subsection (a) of this section, with the exception of the requirements in subsection (a)(4) and (7) of this section.
- 13 (c) (1) Each 4-year public institution of higher education may develop its own procedures for a meal-sharing program.
