A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Family Law – Child Custody and Visitation – Visitation Reevaluations and**
3 **Remedies**

4 FOR the purpose of authorizing a parent to petition a court for an emergency hearing to
5 reevaluate a visitation schedule under certain circumstances; requiring and
6 authorizing a court to take certain actions as a result of a parent's failure to comply
7 with a court-ordered visitation schedule; and generally relating to child custody and
8 visitation.

14 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
15 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

16 **Article – Family Law**

17 **9–109.**

18 **(A) (1) IF A PARENT FAILS TO COMPLY WITH A COURT-ORDERED**
19 **VISITATION SCHEDULE WITHOUT JUST CAUSE, THE OTHER PARENT MAY PETITION**
20 **THE COURT FOR AN EMERGENCY REEVALUATION OF THE VISITATION SCHEDULE.**

21 **(2) IF THE COURT DETERMINES THAT A PETITION IS IN ORDER, THE**
22 **COURT SHALL HOLD AN EMERGENCY HEARING WITHIN 10 DAYS AFTER THE**
23 **PETITION HAS BEEN FILED.**

EXPLANATION: CAPITALS INDICATE MATTER ADDED TO EXISTING LAW.
[Brackets] indicate matter deleted from existing law.



(B) THE COURT:

(1) SHALL:

(I) CALCULATE THE AMOUNT OF VISITATION TIME IMPROPERLY DENIED TO THE PETITIONER;

(II) AWARD THE PETITIONER EXTRA TIME IN AN AMOUNT SUFFICIENT TO COMPENSATE ANY MISSED VISITATION TIME UNDER THE VISITATION AGREEMENT;

(III) SCHEDULE ANY EXTRA TIME AWARDED UNDER ITEM (II) OF THIS ITEM IN A MANNER THAT IS:

1. CONSISTENT WITH THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE CHILD;

2. CONVENIENT FOR THE PETITIONER; AND

3. AT THE EXPENSE OF THE NONCOMPLIANT PARENT;
AND

(IV) ORDER THE NONCOMPLIANT PARENT TO PAY COURT COSTS AND REASONABLE ATTORNEY'S FEES INCURRED BY THE PETITIONER IN THE EFFORT TO ENFORCE THE VISITATION SCHEDULE;

(2) MAY ORDER THE NONCOMPLIANT PARENT TO:

(I) ATTEND A COURT-APPROVED PARENTING COURSE;

(II) PERFORM COMMUNITY SERVICE, IF THE COMMUNITY SERVICE WILL NOT INTERFERE WITH THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE CHILD; AND

(III) ASSUME THE FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY OF ENSURING THAT THE COURT-ORDERED VISITATION SCHEDULE IS MAINTAINED WHEN THE NONCOMPLIANT PARENT AND CHILD LIVE MORE THAN 20 MILES FROM THE PETITIONER;

(3) MAY, ON THE REQUEST OF THE PETITIONER, MODIFY THE VISITATION SCHEDULE IF THE COURT FINDS THAT A MODIFICATION WOULD BE IN THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE CHILD; AND

(4) MAY IMPOSE ANY OTHER REASONABLE SANCTION.

1 (C) A PERSON WHO VIOLATES AN ORDER OF THE COURT UNDER
2 SUBSECTION (B) OF THIS SECTION MAY BE HELD IN CONTEMPT OF COURT.

3 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
4 October 1, 2025.
