A BILL

To require the Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Communications and Information to establish a State Digital Equity Capacity Grant Program, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Digital Equity Act of
- 5 2019".
- 6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
- 7 In this Act:

1	(1) Adoption of Broadband.—The term
2	"adoption of broadband" means the process by
3	which an individual obtains daily access to the inter-
4	net—
5	(A) at a speed, quality, and capacity—
6	(i) that is necessary for the individual
7	to accomplish common tasks; and
8	(ii) such that the access qualifies as
9	an advanced telecommunications capability;
10	(B) with the digital skills that are nec-
11	essary for the individual to participate online;
12	and
13	(C) on a—
14	(i) personal device; and
15	(ii) secure and convenient network.
16	(2) Advanced telecommunications capa-
17	BILITY.—The term "advanced telecommunications
18	capability" has the meaning given the term in sec-
19	tion 706(d) of the Telecommunications Act of 1996
20	(47 U.S.C. 1302(d)).
21	(3) Aging individual.—The term "aging indi-
22	vidual" has the meaning given the term "older indi-
23	vidual" in section 102 of the Older Americans Act
24	of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3002).

1	(4) Appropriate committees of con-
2	GRESS.—The term "appropriate committees of Con-
3	gress'' means—
4	(A) the Committee on Appropriations of
5	the Senate;
6	(B) the Committee on Commerce, Science,
7	and Transportation of the Senate;
8	(C) the Committee on Appropriations of
9	the House of Representatives; and
10	(D) the Committee on Energy and Com-
11	merce of the House of Representatives.
12	(5) Assistant secretary.—The term "Assist-
13	ant Secretary" means the Assistant Secretary of
14	Commerce for Communications and Information.
15	(6) COMMUNITY ANCHOR INSTITUTION.—The
16	term "community anchor institution" means a pub-
17	lic school, a library, a medical or healthcare pro-
18	vider, a community college or other institution of
19	higher education, a State library agency, and any
20	other nonprofit or governmental community support
21	organization.
22	(7) COVERED HOUSEHOLD.—The term "covered
23	household" means a household, the taxable income
24	of which for the most recently completed taxable
25	year is not more than 150 percent of an amount

1	equal to the poverty level, as determined by using
2	criteria of poverty established by the Bureau of the
3	Census.
4	(8) COVERED POPULATIONS.—The term "cov-
5	ered populations" means—
6	(A) individuals who live in covered house-
7	holds;
8	(B) aging individuals;
9	(C) incarcerated individuals, other than in-
10	dividuals who are incarcerated in a Federal cor-
11	rectional facility;
12	(D) veterans;
13	(E) individuals with disabilities;
14	(F) individuals with a language barrier, in-
15	cluding individuals who—
16	(i) are English learners; and
17	(ii) have low levels of literacy;
18	(G) individuals who are members of a ra-
19	cial or ethnic minority group; and
20	(H) individuals who primarily reside in a
21	rural area.
22	(9) COVERED PROGRAMS.—The term "covered
23	programs" means the State Digital Equity Capacity
24	Grant Program established under section 4 and the

1	Digital Equity Competitive Grant Program estab-
2	lished under section 5.
3	(10) DIGITAL EQUITY.—The term "digital eq-
4	uity" means the condition in which individuals and
5	communities have the information technology capac-
6	ity that is needed for full participation in the society
7	and economy of the United States.
8	(11) DIGITAL INCLUSION.—The term "digital
9	inclusion"—
10	(A) means the activities that are necessary
11	to ensure that all individuals in the United
12	States have access to, and the use of, affordable
13	information and communication technologies,
14	such as—
15	(i) reliable fixed and wireless
16	broadband internet service;
17	(ii) internet-enabled devices that meet
18	the needs of the user; and
19	(iii) applications and online content
20	designed to enable and encourage self-suf-
21	ficiency, participation, and collaboration;
22	and
23	(B) includes—
24	(i) obtaining access to digital literacy
25	training;

1	(ii) the provision of quality technical
2	support; and
3	(iii) obtaining basic awareness of
4	measures to ensure online privacy and cy-
5	bersecurity.
6	(12) DIGITAL LITERACY.—The term "digital lit-
7	eracy" means the skills associated with using tech-
8	nology to enable users to find, evaluate, organize,
9	create, and communicate information.
10	(13) DISABILITY.—The term "disability" has
11	the meaning given the term in section 3 of the
12	Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C.
13	12102).
14	(14) ELIGIBLE STATE.—The term "eligible
15	State" means—
16	(A) with respect to planning grants made
17	available under section 4(c)(3), a State with re-
18	spect to which the Assistant Secretary has ap-
19	proved an application submitted to the Assist-
20	ant Secretary under section $4(c)(3)(C)$; and
21	(B) with respect to capacity grants award-
22	ed under section 4(d), a State with respect to
23	which the Assistant Secretary has approved an
24	application submitted to the Assistant Secretary
25	under section 4(d)(2), including approval of the

1	State Digital Equity Plan developed by the
2	State under section 4(c).
3	(15) Gender identity.—The term "gender
4	identity" has the meaning given the term in section
5	249(c) of title 18, United States Code.
6	(16) Indian tribe.—The term "Indian tribe"
7	has the meaning given the term in section 4(e) of
8	the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assist-
9	ance Act (25 U.S.C. 5304(e)).
10	(17) Institution of Higher Education.—
11	The term "institution of higher education"—
12	(A) has the meaning given the term in sec-
13	tion 101 of the Higher Education Act of 1965
14	(20 U.S.C. 1001); and
15	(B) includes a postsecondary vocational in-
16	stitution.
17	(18) Local Educational agency.—The term
18	"local educational agency" has the meaning given
19	the term in section 8101(30) of the Elementary and
20	Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C.
21	7801(30)).
22	(19) Postsecondary vocational institu-
23	TION.—The term "postsecondary vocational institu-
24	tion" has the meaning given the term in section

1	102(c) of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20
2	U.S.C. 1002(e)).
3	(20) Rural area.—The term "rural area" has
4	the meaning given the term in section 601(b)(3) of
5	the Rural Electrification Act of 1936 (7 U.S.C.
6	950bb(b)(3)).
7	(21) Socially and economically disadvan-
8	TAGED SMALL BUSINESS CONCERN.—The term "so-
9	cially and economically disadvantaged small business
10	concern" has the meaning given the term in section
11	8(a)(4) of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C.
12	637(a)(4)).
13	(22) State.—The term "State" means—
14	(A) any State of the United States;
15	(B) the District of Columbia; and
16	(C) the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.
17	(23) Veteran.—The term "veteran" has the
18	meaning given the term in section 101 of title 38,
19	United States Code.
20	(24) Workforce Development Program.—
21	The term "workforce development program" has the
22	meaning given the term in section 3 of the Work-
23	force Innovation and Opportunity Act (29 U.S.C.
24	3102).

1 SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS.

2	It is the sense of Congress that—
3	(1) a broadband connection and digital literacy
4	are increasingly critical to how individuals—
5	(A) participate in the society, economy
6	and civic institutions of the United States; and
7	(B) access health care and essential serv
8	ices, obtain education, and build careers;
9	(2) digital exclusion—
10	(A) carries a high societal and economic
11	cost;
12	(B) materially harms the opportunity of ar
13	individual with respect to the economic success
14	educational achievement, positive health out
15	comes, social inclusion, and civic engagement of
16	that individual; and
17	(C) exacerbates existing wealth and income
18	gaps, especially those experienced by covered
19	populations;
20	(3) achieving digital equity for all people of the
21	United States requires additional and sustained in
22	vestment and research efforts;
23	(4) the Federal Government, as well as State
24	tribal, territorial, and local governments, have made
25	social, legal, and economic obligations that nec

1	essarily extend to how the citizens and residents of
2	those governments access and use the internet; and
3	(5) achieving digital equity is a matter of social
4	and economic justice and is worth pursuing.
5	SEC. 4. STATE DIGITAL EQUITY CAPACITY GRANT PRO-
6	GRAM.
7	(a) Establishment; Purpose.—
8	(1) In General.—The Assistant Secretary
9	shall establish in the Department of Commerce the
10	State Digital Equity Capacity Grant Program (re-
11	ferred to in this section as the "Program")—
12	(A) the purpose of which is to promote the
13	achievement of digital equity, support digital in-
14	clusion activities, and build capacity for efforts
15	by States relating to the adoption of broadband
16	by residents of those States;
17	(B) through which the Assistant Secretary
18	shall make grants to States in accordance with
19	the requirements of this section; and
20	(C) which shall ensure that States have the
21	capacity to promote the achievement of digital
22	equity and support digital inclusion activities.
23	(2) Consultation with other federal
24	AGENCIES; NO CONFLICT.—In establishing the Pro-

1	gram under paragraph (1), the Assistant Secretary
2	shall—
3	(A) consult with—
4	(i) the Secretary of Agriculture;
5	(ii) the Secretary of Housing and
6	Urban Development;
7	(iii) the Secretary of Education;
8	(iv) the Secretary of Labor;
9	(v) the Secretary of Health and
10	Human Services;
11	(vi) the Secretary of Veterans Affairs;
12	(vii) the Secretary of the Interior;
13	(viii) the Federal Communications
14	Commission;
15	(ix) the Federal Trade Commission;
16	(x) the Director of the Institute of
17	Museum and Library Services;
18	(xi) the Administrator of the Small
19	Business Administration;
20	(xii) the Federal Co-Chair of the Ap-
21	palachian Regional Commission; and
22	(xiii) the head of any other agency
23	that the Assistant Secretary determines to
24	be appropriate; and

1	(B) ensure that the Program complements
2	and enhances, and does not conflict with, other
3	Federal broadband initiatives and programs.
4	(b) Administering Entity.—
5	(1) Selection; function.—The governor (or
6	equivalent official) of a State that wishes to be
7	awarded a grant under this section shall, from
8	among entities that are eligible under paragraph (2),
9	select an administering entity for that State, which
10	shall—
11	(A) serve as the recipient of, and admin-
12	istering agent for, any grant awarded to the
13	State under this section;
14	(B) develop, implement, and oversee the
15	State Digital Equity Plan for the State de-
16	scribed in subsection (c);
17	(C) make subgrants to any entity described
18	in subsection $(c)(1)(D)$ that is located in the
19	State in support of—
20	(i) the State Digital Equity Plan for
21	the State; and
22	(ii) digital inclusion activities in the
23	State generally; and
24	(D) serve as—

1	(i) an advocate for digital equity pol-
2	icy and digital inclusion activities; and
3	(ii) a repository of best practice mate-
4	rials regarding the policies and activities
5	described in clause (i).
6	(2) Eligible entities.—Any of the following
7	entities may serve as the administering entity for a
8	State for the purposes of this section if the entity
9	has demonstrated a capacity to administer the Pro-
10	gram on a statewide level:
11	(A) The State, a political subdivision,
12	agency, or instrumentality of the State, an In-
13	dian tribe located in the State, an Alaska Na-
14	tive entity located in the State, or a Native Ha-
15	waiian organization located in the State.
16	(B) A foundation, corporation, institution,
17	association, or coalition that is—
18	(i) a not-for-profit entity;
19	(ii) located in the State; and
20	(iii) not a school.
21	(C) A community anchor institution, other
22	than a school, that is located in the State.
23	(D) A local educational agency that is lo-
24	cated in the State.

1	(E) An entity located in the State that car-
2	ries out a workforce development program.
3	(F) An agency of the State that is respon-
4	sible for administering or supervising adult edu-
5	cation and literacy activities in the State.
6	(G) A public housing authority that is lo-
7	cated in the State.
8	(H) A partnership between any of the enti-
9	ties described in subparagraphs (A) through
10	(G).
11	(c) STATE DIGITAL EQUITY PLAN.—
12	(1) Development; contents.—A State that
13	wishes to be awarded a grant under subsection (d)
14	shall develop a State Digital Equity Plan for the
15	State, which shall include—
16	(A) the identification of the barriers to dig-
17	ital equity faced by covered populations in the
18	State;
19	(B) measurable objectives for documenting
20	and promoting, among each group described in
21	subparagraphs (A) through (H) of section 2(8)
22	located in that State—
23	(i) the availability of, and affordability
24	of access to, fixed and wireless broadband
25	technology;

1	(ii) the online accessibility and
2	inclusivity of public resources and services;
3	(iii) digital literacy;
4	(iv) awareness of, and the use of,
5	measures to secure the online privacy of,
6	and cybersecurity with respect to, an indi-
7	vidual; and
8	(v) the availability and affordability of
9	consumer devices and technical support for
10	those devices;
11	(C) an assessment of how the objectives
12	described in subparagraph (B) will impact and
13	interact with the State's—
14	(i) economic and workforce develop-
15	ment goals, plans, and outcomes;
16	(ii) educational outcomes;
17	(iii) health outcomes;
18	(iv) civic and social engagement; and
19	(v) delivery of other essential services;
20	(D) in order to achieve the objectives de-
21	scribed in subparagraph (B), a description of
22	how the State plans to collaborate with key
23	stakeholders in the State, which may include—
24	(i) community anchor institutions;

1	(ii) county and municipal govern-
2	ments;
3	(iii) local educational agencies;
4	(iv) where applicable, Indian tribes,
5	Alaska Native entities, or Native Hawaiian
6	organizations;
7	(v) nonprofit organizations;
8	(vi) organizations that represent—
9	(I) individuals with disabilities,
10	including organizations that represent
11	children with disabilities;
12	(II) aging individuals;
13	(III) individuals with language
14	barriers, including—
15	(aa) individuals who are
16	English learners; and
17	(bb) individuals who have
18	low levels of literacy;
19	(IV) veterans; and
20	(V) individuals in that State who
21	are incarcerated in facilities other
22	than Federal correctional facilities;
23	(vii) civil rights organizations;
24	(viii) entities that carry out workforce
25	development programs;

1	(ix) agencies of the State that are re-
2	sponsible for administering or supervising
3	adult education and literacy activities in
4	the State;
5	(x) public housing authorities in the
6	State; and
7	(xi) a partnership between any of the
8	entities described in clauses (i) through
9	(x); and
10	(E) a list of organizations with which the
11	administering entity for the State collaborated
12	in developing and implementing the Plan.
13	(2) Public availability.—
14	(A) In general.—The administering enti-
15	ty for a State shall make the State Digital Eq-
16	uity Plan of the State available for public com-
17	ment for a period of not less than 30 days be-
18	fore the date on which the State submits an ap-
19	plication to the Assistant Secretary under sub-
20	section $(d)(2)$.
21	(B) Consideration of comments re-
22	CEIVED.—The administering entity for a State
23	shall, with respect to an application submitted
24	to the Assistant Secretary under subsection
25	(d)(2)—

1	(i) before submitting the application—
2	(I) consider all comments re-
3	ceived during the comment period de-
4	scribed in subparagraph (A) with re-
5	spect to the application (referred to in
6	this subparagraph as the "comment
7	period"); and
8	(II) make any changes to the
9	plan that the administering entity de-
10	termines to be worthwhile; and
11	(ii) when submitting the application—
12	(I) describe any changes pursued
13	by the administering entity in re-
14	sponse to comments received during
15	the comment period; and
16	(II) include a written response to
17	each comment received during the
18	comment period.
19	(3) Planning grants.—
20	(A) In General.—Beginning in the first
21	fiscal year that begins after the date of enact-
22	ment of this Act, the Assistant Secretary shall,
23	in accordance with the requirements of this
24	paragraph, award planning grants to States for
25	the purpose of developing the State Digital Eq-

1	uity Plans of those States under this sub-
2	section.
3	(B) Eligibility.—In order to be awarded
4	a planning grant under this paragraph, a
5	State—
6	(i) shall submit to the Assistant Sec-
7	retary an application under subparagraph
8	(C); and
9	(ii) may not have been awarded, at
10	any time, a planning grant under this
11	paragraph.
12	(C) APPLICATION.—A State that wishes to
13	be awarded a planning grant under this para-
14	graph shall, not later than 60 days after the
15	date on which the notice of funding availability
16	with respect to the grant is released, submit to
17	the Assistant Secretary an application, in a for-
18	mat to be determined by the Assistant Sec-
19	retary, that contains the following materials:
20	(i) A description of the entity selected
21	to serve as the administering entity for the
22	State, as described in subsection (b).
23	(ii) A certification from the State
24	that, not later than 1 year after the date
25	on which the Assistant Secretary awards

1	the planning grant to the State, the ad-
2	ministering entity for that State shall de-
3	velop a State Digital Equity Plan under
4	this subsection, which—
5	(I) the administering entity shall
6	submit to the Assistant Secretary; and
7	(II) shall comply with the re-
8	quirements of this subsection, includ-
9	ing the requirement under paragraph
10	(2)(B).
11	(iii) The assurances required under
12	subsection (e).
13	(D) Awards.—
14	(i) Amount of grant.—A planning
15	grant awarded to an eligible State under
16	this paragraph shall be determined accord-
17	ing to the formula under subsection
18	(d)(3)(A)(i).
19	(ii) Duration.—
20	(I) In general.—Except as pro-
21	vided in subclause (II), with respect to
22	a planning grant awarded to an eligi-
23	ble State under this paragraph, the
24	State shall expend the grant funds
25	during the 1-year period beginning on

1	the date on which the State is award-
2	ed the grant funds.
3	(II) Exception.—The Assistant
4	Secretary may grant an extension of
5	not longer than 180 days with respect
6	to the requirement under subclause
7	(I).
8	(iii) Challenge mechanism.—The
9	Assistant Secretary shall ensure that any
10	eligible State to which a planning grant is
11	awarded under this paragraph may appeal
12	or otherwise challenge in a timely fashion
13	the amount of the grant awarded to the
14	State, as determined under clause (i).
15	(E) USE OF FUNDS.—An eligible State to
16	which a planning grant is awarded under this
17	paragraph shall, through the administering en-
18	tity for that State, use the grant funds only for
19	the following purposes:
20	(i) To develop the State Digital Eq-
21	uity Plan of the State under this sub-
22	section.
23	(ii)(I) Subject to subclause (II), to
24	make subgrants to any of the entities de-
25	scribed in paragraph (1)(D) to assist in

1	the development of the State Digital Eq-
2	uity Plan of the State under this sub-
3	section.
4	(II) If the administering entity for a
5	State makes a subgrant described in sub-
6	clause (I), the administering entity shall,
7	with respect to the subgrant, provide to the
8	State the assurances required under sub-
9	section (e).
10	(d) State Capacity Grants.—
11	(1) In general.—Beginning not later than 2
12	years after the date on which the Assistant Sec-
13	retary begins awarding planning grants under sub-
14	section (c)(3), the Assistant Secretary shall each
15	year award grants to eligible States to support—
16	(A) the implementation of the State Dig-
17	ital Equity Plans of those States; and
18	(B) digital inclusion activities in those
19	States.
20	(2) APPLICATION.—A State that wishes to be
21	awarded a grant under this subsection shall, not
22	later than 60 days after the date on which the notice
23	of funding availability with respect to the grant is

released, submit to the Assistant Secretary an appli-

24

1	cation, in a format to be determined by the Assist-
2	ant Secretary, that contains the following materials:
3	(A) A description of the entity selected to
4	serve as the administering entity for the State,
5	as described in subsection (b).
6	(B) The State Digital Equity Plan of that
7	State, as described in subsection (c).
8	(C) A certification that the State, acting
9	through the administering entity for the State,
10	shall—
11	(i) implement the State Digital Equity
12	Plan of the State; and
13	(ii) make grants in a manner that is
14	consistent with the aims of the Plan de-
15	scribed in clause (i).
16	(D) The assurances required under sub-
17	section (e).
18	(E) In the case of a State to which the As-
19	sistant Secretary has previously awarded a
20	grant under this subsection, any amendments
21	to the State Digital Equity Plan of that State,
22	as compared with the State Digital Equity Plan
23	of the State previously submitted.
24	(3) Awards.—
25	(A) Amount of grant.—

1	(i) FORMULA.—Subject to clauses (ii),
2	(iii), and (iv), the Assistant Secretary shall
3	calculate the amount of a grant awarded to
4	an eligible State under this subsection in
5	accordance with the following criteria,
6	using the best available data for all States
7	for the fiscal year in which the grant is
8	awarded:
9	(I) 50 percent of the total grant
10	amount shall be based on the popu-
11	lation of the eligible State in propor-
12	tion to the total population of all eligi-
13	ble States.
14	(II) 25 percent of the total grant
15	amount shall be based on the number
16	of individuals in the eligible State who
17	are covered populations in proportion
18	to the total number of individuals in
19	all eligible States who are covered
20	populations.
21	(III) 25 percent of the total
22	grant amount shall be based on the
23	comparative lack of availability and
24	adoption of broadband in the eligible
25	State in proportion to the lack of

1	availability and adoption of broadband
2	of all eligible States, which shall be
3	determined according to data collected
4	from—
5	(aa) the annual inquiry of
6	the Federal Communications
7	Commission conducted under sec-
8	tion 706(b) of the Telecommuni-
9	cations Act of 1996 (47 U.S.C.
10	1302(b));
11	(bb) the American Commu-
12	nity Survey or, if necessary,
13	other data collected by the Bu-
14	reau of the Census;
15	(cc) the Internet and Com-
16	puter Use Supplement to the
17	Current Population Survey of the
18	Bureau of the Census; and
19	(dd) any other source that
20	the Assistant Secretary, after ap-
21	propriate notice and opportunity
22	for public comment, determines
23	to be appropriate.
24	(ii) Minimum award.—The amount
25	of a grant awarded to an eligible State

1	under this subsection in a fiscal year shall
2	be not less than 0.5 percent of the total
3	amount made available to award grants to
4	eligible States for that fiscal year.
5	(iii) Additional amounts.—If, after
6	awarding planning grants to States under
7	subsection (c)(3) and capacity grants to el-
8	igible States under this subsection in a fis-
9	cal year, there are amounts remaining to
10	carry out this section, the Assistant Sec-
11	retary shall distribute those amounts—
12	(I) to eligible States to which the
13	Assistant Secretary has awarded
14	grants under this subsection for that
15	fiscal year; and
16	(II) in accordance with the for-
17	mula described in clause (i).
18	(iv) Data unavailable.—If, in a fis-
19	cal year, the Commonwealth of Puerto
20	Rico (referred to in this clause as "Puerto
21	Rico") is an eligible State and specific data
22	for Puerto Rico is unavailable for a factor
23	described in subclause (I), (II), or (II) of
24	clause (i), the Assistant Secretary shall use
25	the median data point with respect to that

1	factor among all eligible States and assign
2	it to Puerto Rico for the purposes of mak-
3	ing any calculation under that clause for
4	that fiscal year.
5	(B) Duration.—With respect to a grant
6	awarded to an eligible State under this sub-
7	section, the eligible State shall expend the grant
8	funds during the 5-year period beginning on the
9	date on which the eligible State is awarded the
10	grant funds.
11	(C) CHALLENGE MECHANISM.—The As-
12	sistant Secretary shall ensure that any eligible
13	State to which a grant is awarded under this
14	subsection may appeal or otherwise challenge in
15	a timely fashion the amount of the grant
16	awarded to the State, as determined under sub-
17	paragraph (A).
18	(D) USE OF FUNDS.—The administering
19	entity for an eligible State to which a grant is
20	awarded under this subsection shall use the
21	grant amounts for the following purposes:
22	(i)(I) Subject to subclause (II), to up-
23	date or maintain the State Digital Equity
24	Plan of the State.

1	(II) An administering entity for an el-
2	igible State to which a grant is awarded
3	under this subsection may use not more
4	than 20 percent of the amount of the
5	grant for the purpose described in sub-
6	clause (I).
7	(ii) To implement the State Digital
8	Equity Plan of the State.
9	(iii)(I) Subject to subclause (II), to

20	(cc) report to the State regarding
21	the digital inclusion activities of the
22	entity.
23	(II) Before an administering entity
24	for an eligible State may award a grant
25	under subclause (I), the administering en-

1	tity shall require the entity to which the
2	grant is awarded to certify that—
3	(aa) the entity shall carry out the
4	activities required under items (aa),
5	(bb), and (cc) of that subclause;
6	(bb) the receipt of the grant shall
7	not result in unjust enrichment of the
8	entity; and
9	(cc) the entity shall cooperate
10	with any evaluation—
11	(AA) of any program that
12	relates to a grant awarded to the
13	entity; and
14	(BB) that is carried out by
15	or for the administering entity,
16	the Assistant Secretary, or an-
17	other Federal official.
18	(iv)(I) Subject to subclause (II), to
19	evaluate the efficacy of the efforts funded
20	by grants made under clause (iii).
21	(II) An administering entity for an el-
22	igible State to which a grant is awarded
23	under this subsection may use not more
24	than 5 percent of the amount of the grant
25	for a purpose described in subclause (I).

1	(v)(I) Subject to subclause (II), for
2	the administrative costs incurred in car-
3	rying out the activities described in clauses
4	(i) through (iv).
5	(II) An administering entity for an el-
6	igible State to which a grant is awarded
7	under this subsection may use not more
8	than 3 percent of the amount of the grant
9	for a purpose described in subclause (I).
10	(e) Assurances.—When applying for a grant under
11	this section, a State shall include in the application for
12	that grant assurances that—
13	(1) if an entity described in section 5(b) is
14	awarded grant funds under this section (referred to
15	in this subsection as a "covered recipient"), provide
16	that—
17	(A) the covered recipient shall use the
18	grant funds in accordance with any applicable
19	statute, regulation, and application procedure;
20	(B) the administering entity for that State
21	shall adopt and use proper methods of admin-
22	istering any grant that the covered recipient is
23	awarded, including by—
24	(i) enforcing any obligation imposed
25	under law on any agency, institution, orga-

1	nization, or other entity that is responsible
2	for carrying out the program to which the
3	grant relates;
4	(ii) correcting any deficiency in the
5	operation of a program to which the grant
6	relates, as identified through an audit or
7	another monitoring or evaluation proce-
8	dure; and
9	(iii) adopting written procedures for
10	the receipt and resolution of complaints al-
11	leging a violation of law with respect to a
12	program to which the grant relates; and
13	(C) the administering entity for that State
14	shall cooperate in carrying out any evaluation—
15	(i) of any program that relates to a
16	grant awarded to the covered recipient;
17	and
18	(ii) that is carried out by or for the
19	Assistant Secretary or another Federal of-
20	ficial;
21	(2) the administering entity for that State
22	shall—
23	(A) use fiscal control and fund accounting
24	procedures that ensure the proper disbursement

1	of, and accounting for, any Federal funds that
2	the State is awarded under this section;
3	(B) submit to the Assistant Secretary any
4	reports that may be necessary to enable the As-
5	sistant Secretary to perform the duties of the
6	Assistant Secretary under this section;
7	(C) maintain any records and provide any
8	information to the Assistant Secretary, includ-
9	ing those records, that the Assistant Secretary
10	determines is necessary to enable the Assistant
11	Secretary to perform the duties of the Assistant
12	Secretary under this section; and
13	(D) with respect to any significant pro-
14	posed change or amendment to the State Dig-
15	ital Equity Plan for the State, make the change
16	or amendment available for public comment in
17	accordance with subsection (e)(2); and
18	(3) the State, before submitting to the Assist-
19	ant Secretary the State Digital Equity Plan of the
20	State, has complied with the requirements of sub-
21	section $(c)(2)$.
22	(f) TERMINATION OF GRANT.—
23	(1) In General.—The Assistant Secretary
24	shall terminate a grant awarded to an eligible State

1	under this section if, after notice to the State and
2	opportunity for a hearing, the Assistant Secretary—
3	(A) presents to the State a rationale and
4	supporting information that clearly dem-
5	onstrates that—
6	(i) the grant funds are not contrib-
7	uting to the development or execution of
8	the State Digital Equity Plan of the State,
9	as applicable; and
10	(ii) the State is not upholding assur-
11	ances made by the State to the Assistant
12	Secretary under subsection (e); and
13	(B) determines that the grant is no longer
14	necessary to achieve the original purpose for
15	which Assistant Secretary awarded the grant.
16	(2) Redistribution.—If the Assistant Sec-
17	retary, in a fiscal year, terminates a grant under
18	paragraph (1), the Assistant Secretary shall redis-
19	tribute the unspent grant amounts—
20	(A) to eligible States to which the Assist-
21	ant Secretary has awarded grants under sub-
22	section (d) for that fiscal year; and
23	(B) in accordance with the formula de-
24	scribed in subsection $(d)(3)(A)(i)$.

1	(g) Reporting and Information Requirements;
2	Internet Disclosure.—The Assistant Secretary—
3	(1) shall—
4	(A) require any entity to which a grant, in-
5	cluding a subgrant, is awarded under this sec-
6	tion to publicly report, for each year during the
7	period described in subsection (c)(3)(D)(ii) or
8	(d)(3)(B), as applicable, with respect to the
9	grant, and in a format specified by the Assist-
10	ant Secretary, on—
11	(i) the use of that grant by the entity;
12	(ii) the progress of the entity towards
13	fulfilling the objectives for which the grant
14	was awarded; and
15	(iii) the implementation of the State
16	Digital Equity Plan of the State;
17	(B) establish appropriate mechanisms to
18	ensure that each eligible State to which a grant
19	is awarded under this section—
20	(i) uses the grant amounts in an ap-
21	propriate manner; and
22	(ii) complies with all terms with re-
23	spect to the use of the grant amounts; and
24	(C) create and maintain a fully searchable
25	database, which shall be accessible on the inter-

1	net at no cost to the public, that contains, at
2	a minimum—
3	(i) the application of each State that
4	has applied for a grant under this section;
5	(ii) the status of each application de-
6	scribed in clause (i);
7	(iii) each report submitted by an enti-
8	ty under subparagraph (A);
9	(iv) a record of public comments made
10	regarding the State Digital Equity Plan of
11	a State, as well as any written responses to
12	or actions taken in as a result of those
13	comments; and
14	(v) any other information that is suf-
15	ficient to allow the public to understand
16	and monitor grants awarded under this
17	section; and
18	(2) may establish additional reporting and in-
19	formation requirements for any recipient of a grant
20	under this section.
21	(h) Supplement Not Supplant.—A grant or
22	subgrant awarded under this section shall supplement, not
23	supplant, other Federal or State funds that have been
24	made available to carry out activities described in this sec-
25	tion.

1	(i) Set Asides.—From amounts made available in
2	a fiscal year to carry out the Program, the Assistant Sec-
3	retary shall reserve—
4	(1) not more than 5 percent for the implemen-
5	tation and administration of the Program, which
6	shall include—
7	(A) providing technical support and assist-
8	ance, including ensuring consistency in data re-
9	porting;
10	(B) providing assistance to—
11	(i) States, or administering entities
12	for States, to prepare the applications of
13	those States; and
14	(ii) administering entities with respect
15	to grants awarded under this section; and
16	(C) developing the report required under
17	section 6(a);
18	(2) not less than 5 percent to award grants to,
19	or enter into contracts or cooperative agreements
20	with, Indian tribes, Alaska Native entities, and Na-
21	tive Hawaiian organizations to allow those tribes,
22	entities, and organizations to carry out the activities
23	described in this section; and
24	(3) not less than 1 percent to award grants to,
25	or enter into contracts or cooperative agreements

1	with, the United States Virgin Islands, Guam,
2	American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the North-
3	ern Mariana Islands, and any other territory or pos-
4	session of the United States that is not a State to
5	enable those entities to carry out the activities de-
6	scribed in this section.
7	(j) Rules.—The Assistant Secretary may prescribe
8	such rules as may be necessary to carry out this section.
9	(k) Authorization of Appropriations.—There
10	are authorized to be appropriated—
11	(1) \$60,000,000 for the award of grants under
12	subsection $(c)(3)$, which shall remain available until
13	expended;
14	(2) for each of the first 5 fiscal years in which
15	amounts are made available to award grants under
16	subsection (d), \$125,000,000 for the award of those
17	grants; and
18	(3) such sums as may be necessary to carry out
19	this section for each fiscal year after the end of the
20	5-fiscal year period described in paragraph (2).
21	SEC. 5. DIGITAL EQUITY COMPETITIVE GRANT PROGRAM.
22	(a) Establishment.—
23	(1) In general.—Not later than 30 days after
24	the date on which the Assistant Secretary begins
25	awarding grants under section 4(d), and not before

1	that date, the Assistant Secretary shall establish in
2	the Department of Commerce the Digital Equity
3	Competitive Grant Program (referred to in this sec-
4	tion as the "Program"), the purpose of which is to
5	award grants to support efforts to achieve digital eq-
6	uity, promote digital inclusion activities, and spur
7	greater adoption of broadband among covered popu-
8	lations.
9	(2) Consultation; no conflict.—In estab-
10	lishing the Program under paragraph (1), the As-
11	sistant Secretary—
12	(A) may consult a State with respect to—
13	(i) the identification of groups de-
14	scribed in subparagraphs (A) through (H)
15	of section 2(8) located in that State; and
16	(ii) the allocation of grant funds with-
17	in that State for projects in or affecting
18	the State; and
19	(B) shall—
20	(i) consult with—
21	(I) the Secretary of Agriculture;
22	(II) the Secretary of Housing
23	and Urban Development;
24	(III) the Secretary of Education;
25	(IV) the Secretary of Labor;

1	(V) the Secretary of Health and
2	Human Services;
3	(VI) the Secretary of Veterans
4	Affairs;
5	(VII) the Secretary of the Inte-
6	rior;
7	(VIII) the Federal Communica-
8	tions Commission;
9	(IX) the Federal Trade Commis-
10	sion;
11	(X) the Director of the Institute
12	of Museum and Library Services;
13	(XI) the Administrator of the
14	Small Business Administration;
15	(XII) the Federal Co-Chair of
16	the Appalachian Regional Commis-
17	sion; and
18	(XIII) the head of any other
19	agency that the Assistant Secretary
20	determines to be appropriate; and
21	(ii) ensure that the Program com-
22	plements and enhances, and does not con-
23	flict with, other Federal broadband initia-
24	tives and programs.

1	(b) Eligibility.—The Assistant Secretary may
2	award a grant under the Program to any of the following
3	entities if the entity is not serving, and has not served,
4	as the administering entity for a State under section 4(b):
5	(1) A political subdivision, agency, or instru-
6	mentality of a State, including an agency of a State
7	that is responsible for administering or supervising
8	adult education and literacy activities in the State.
9	(2) An Indian tribe, an Alaska Native entity, or
10	a Native Hawaiian organization.
11	(3) A foundation, corporation, institution, or
12	association that is—
13	(A) a not-for-profit entity; and
14	(B) not a school.
15	(4) A community anchor institution.
16	(5) A local educational agency.
17	(6) An entity that carries out a workforce devel-
18	opment program.
19	(7) A partnership between any of the entities
20	described in paragraphs (1) through (6).
21	(8) A partnership between—
22	(A) an entity described in any of para-
23	graphs (1) through (6); and
24	(B) an entity that—

1	(i) the Assistant Secretary, by rule,
2	determines to be in the public interest; and
3	(ii) is not a school.
4	(c) Application.—An entity that wishes to be
5	awarded a grant under the Program shall submit to the
6	Assistant Secretary an application—
7	(1) at such time, in such form, and containing
8	such information as the Assistant Secretary may re-
9	quire; and
10	(2) that—
11	(A) provides a detailed explanation of how
12	the entity will use any grant amounts awarded
13	under the Program to carry out the purposes of
14	the Program in an efficient and expeditious
15	manner;
16	(B) identifies the period in which the ap-
17	plicant will expend the grant funds awarded
18	under the Program;
19	(C) includes—
20	(i) a justification for the amount of
21	the grant that the applicant is requesting;
22	and
23	(ii) for each fiscal year in which the
24	applicant will expend the grant funds, a

1	budget for the activities that the grant
2	funds will support;
3	(D) demonstrates to the satisfaction of the
4	Assistant Secretary that the entity—
5	(i) is capable of carrying out—
6	(I) the project or function to
7	which the application relates; and
8	(II) the activities described in
9	subsection (h)—
10	(aa) in a competent manner;
11	and
12	(bb) in compliance with all
13	applicable Federal, State, and
14	local laws; and
15	(ii) if the applicant is an entity de-
16	scribed in subsection (b)(1), shall appro-
17	priate or otherwise unconditionally obligate
18	from non-Federal sources funds that are
19	necessary to meet the requirements of sub-
20	section (e);
21	(E) discloses to the Assistant Secretary the
22	source and amount of other Federal, State, or
23	outside funding sources from which the entity
24	receives, or has applied for, funding for activi-

1	ties or projects to which the application relates;
2	and
3	(F) provides—
4	(i) the assurances that are required
5	under subsection (f); and
6	(ii) an assurance that the entity shall
7	follow such additional procedures as the
8	Assistant Secretary may require to ensure
9	that grant funds are used and accounted
10	for in an appropriate manner.
11	(d) Award of Grants.—
12	(1) Factors considered in Award of
13	GRANTS.—In deciding whether to award a grant
14	under the Program, the Assistant Secretary shall, to
15	the extent practicable, consider—
16	(A) whether—
17	(i) an application shall, if approved—
18	(I) increase internet access and
19	the adoption of broadband among cov-
20	ered populations to be served by the
21	applicant; and
22	(II) not result in unjust enrich-
23	ment; and

1	(ii) the applicant is, or plans to sub-
2	contract with, a socially and economically
3	disadvantaged small business concern;
4	(B) the comparative geographic diversity of
5	the application in relation to other eligible ap-
6	plications; and
7	(C) the extent to which an application may
8	duplicate or conflict with another program.
9	(2) Use of funds.—
10	(A) In general.—In addition to the ac-
11	tivities required under subparagraph (B), an
12	entity to which the Assistant Secretary awards
13	a grant under the Program shall use the grant
14	amounts to support not less than 1 of the fol-
15	lowing activities:
16	(i) To develop and implement digital
17	inclusion activities that benefit covered
18	populations.
19	(ii) To facilitate the adoption of
20	broadband by covered populations in order
21	to provide educational and employment op-
22	portunities to those populations.
23	(iii) To implement, consistent with the
24	purposes of this Act—

1	(I) training programs for covered
2	populations that cover basic, ad-
3	vanced, and applied skills; or
4	(II) other workforce development
5	programs.
6	(iv) To make available equipment, in-
7	strumentation, networking capability, hard-
8	ware and software, or digital network tech-
9	nology for broadband services to covered
10	populations at low or no cost.
11	(v) To construct, upgrade, expend, or
12	operate new or existing public access com-
13	puting centers for covered populations
14	through community anchor institutions.
15	(vi) To undertake any other project
16	and activity that the Assistant Secretary
17	finds to be consistent with the purposes for
18	which the Program is established.
19	(B) EVALUATION.—
20	(i) IN GENERAL.—An entity to which
21	the Assistant Secretary awards a grant
22	under the Program shall use not more
23	than 10 percent of the grant amounts to
24	measure and evaluate the activities sup-
25	ported with the grant amounts.

1	(ii) Submission to assistant sec-
2	RETARY.—An entity to which the Assistant
3	Secretary awards a grant under the Pro-
4	gram shall submit to the Assistant Sec-
5	retary each measurement and evaluation
6	performed under clause (i)—
7	(I) in a manner specified by the
8	Assistant Secretary;
9	(II) not later than 15 months
10	after the date on which the entity is
11	awarded the grant amounts; and
12	(III) annually after the submis-
13	sion described in subclause (II) for
14	any year in which the entity expends
15	grant amounts.
16	(C) Administrative costs.—An entity to
17	which the Assistant Secretary awards a grant
18	under the Program may use not more than 10
19	percent of the amount of the grant for adminis-
20	trative costs in carrying out any of the activities
21	described in subparagraph (A).
22	(D) TIME LIMITATIONS.—With respect to
23	a grant awarded to an entity under the Pro-
24	gram, the entity—

1	(i) except as provided in clause (ii),
2	shall expend the grant amounts during the
3	4-year period beginning on the date on
4	which the entity is awarded the grant
5	amounts; and
6	(ii) during the 1-year period beginning
7	on the date that is 4 years after the date
8	on which the entity is awarded the grant
9	amounts, may continue to measure and
10	evaluate the activities supported with the
11	grant amounts, as required under subpara-
12	graph (B).
13	(e) Federal Share.—
14	(1) In general.—Except as provided in para-
15	graph (2), the Federal share of any project for
16	which the Assistant Secretary awards a grant under
17	the Program may not exceed 90 percent.
18	(2) Exception.—The Assistant Secretary may
19	grant a waiver with respect to the limitation on the
20	Federal share of a project described in paragraph
21	(1) if—
22	(A) the applicant with respect to the
23	project petitions the Assistant Secretary for the
24	waiver; and

1	(B) the Assistant Secretary determines
2	that the petition described in subparagraph (A)
3	demonstrates financial need.
4	(f) Assurances.—When applying for a grant under
5	this section, an entity shall include in the application for
6	that grant assurances that the entity shall—
7	(1) use any grant funds that the entity is
8	awarded—
9	(A) in accordance with any applicable stat-
10	ute, regulation, and application procedure; and
11	(B) to the extent required under applicable
12	law;
13	(2) adopt and use proper methods of admin-
14	istering any grant that the entity is awarded, includ-
15	ing by—
16	(A) enforcing any obligation imposed under
17	law on any agency, institution, organization, or
18	other entity that is responsible for carrying out
19	a program to which the grant relates;
20	(B) correcting any deficiency in the oper-
21	ation of a program to which the grant relates,
22	as identified through an audit or another moni-
23	toring or evaluation procedure; and
24	(C) adopting written procedures for the re-
25	ceipt and resolution of complaints alleging a

1	violation of law with respect to a program to
2	which the grant relates;
3	(3) cooperate with respect to any evaluation—
4	(A) of any program that relates to a grant
5	awarded to the entity; and
6	(B) that is carried out by or for the Assist-
7	ant Secretary or another Federal official;
8	(4) use fiscal control and fund accounting pro-
9	cedures that ensure the proper disbursement of, and
10	accounting for, any Federal funds that the entity is
11	awarded under the Program;
12	(5) submit to the Assistant Secretary any re-
13	ports that may be necessary to enable the Assistant
14	Secretary to perform the duties of the Assistant Sec-
15	retary under the Program; and
16	(6) maintain any records and provide any infor-
17	mation to the Assistant Secretary, including those
18	records, that the Assistant Secretary determines is
19	necessary to enable the Assistant Secretary to per-
20	form the duties of the Assistant Secretary under the
21	Program.
22	(g) Deobligation or Termination of Grant.—
23	In addition to other authority under applicable law, the
24	Assistant Secretary may—

1	(1) deobligate or terminate a grant awarded to
2	an entity under this section if, after notice to the en-
3	tity and opportunity for a hearing, the Assistant
4	Secretary—
5	(A) presents to the entity a rationale and
6	supporting information that clearly dem-
7	onstrates that—
8	(i) the grant funds are not being used
9	in a manner that is consistent with the ap-
10	plication with respect to the grant sub-
11	mitted by the entity under subsection (c);
12	and
13	(ii) the entity is not upholding assur-
14	ances made by the entity to the Assistant
15	Secretary under subsection (f); and
16	(B) determines that the grant is no longer
17	necessary to achieve the original purpose for
18	which Assistant Secretary awarded the grant;
19	and
20	(2) with respect to any grant funds that the As-
21	sistant Secretary deobligates or terminates under
22	paragraph (1), competitively award the grant funds
23	to another applicant, consistent with the require-
24	ments of this section.

1	(h) Reporting and Information Requirements;
2	Internet Disclosure.—The Assistant Secretary—
3	(1) shall—
4	(A) require any entity to which the Assist-
5	ant Secretary awards a grant under the Pro-
6	gram to, for each year during the period de-
7	scribed in subsection (d)(2)(D) with respect to
8	the grant, submit to the Assistant Secretary a
9	report, in a format specified by the Assistant
10	Secretary, regarding—
11	(i) the amount of the grant;
12	(ii) the use by the entity of the grant
13	amounts; and
14	(iii) the progress of the entity towards
15	fulfilling the objectives for which the grant
16	was awarded;
17	(B) establish mechanisms to ensure appro-
18	priate use of, and compliance with respect to all
19	terms regarding, grant funds awarded under
20	the Program;
21	(C) create and maintain a fully searchable
22	database, which shall be accessible on the inter-
23	net at no cost to the public, that contains, at
24	a minimum—

1	(i) a list of each entity that has ap-
2	plied for a grant under the Program;
3	(ii) a description of each application
4	described in clause (i), including the pro-
5	posed purpose of each grant described in
6	that clause;
7	(iii) the status of each application de-
8	scribed in clause (i), including whether the
9	Assistant Secretary has awarded a grant
10	with respect to the application and, if so,
11	the amount of the grant;
12	(iv) each report submitted by an enti-
13	ty under subparagraph (A); and
14	(v) any other information that is suf-
15	ficient to allow the public to understand
16	and monitor grants awarded under the
17	Program; and
18	(D) ensure that any entity with respect to
19	which an award is deobligated or terminated
20	under subsection (g) may, in a timely manner,
21	appeal or otherwise challenge that deobligation
22	or termination, as applicable; and
23	(2) may establish additional reporting and in-
24	formation requirements for any recipient of a grant
25	under the Program.

1	(i) Supplement Not Supplant.—A grant awarded
2	to an entity under the Program shall supplement, not sup-
3	plant, other Federal or State funds that have been made
4	available to the entity to carry out activities described in
5	this section.
6	(j) Set Asides.—From amounts made available in
7	a fiscal year to carry out the Program, the Assistant Sec-
8	retary shall reserve—
9	(1) 5 percent for the implementation and ad-
10	ministration of the Program, which shall include—
11	(A) providing technical support and assist-
12	ance, including ensuring consistency in data re-
13	porting;
14	(B) providing assistance to entities to pre-
15	pare the applications of those entities with re-
16	spect to grants awarded under this section;
17	(C) developing the report required under
18	section 6(a); and
19	(D) conducting outreach to entities that
20	may be eligible to be awarded a grant under the
21	Program regarding opportunities to apply for
22	such a grant;
23	(2) 5 percent to award grants to, or enter into
24	contracts or cooperative agreements with, Indian
25	tribes, Alaska Native entities, and Native Hawaiian

1	organizations to allow those tribes, entities, and or-
2	ganizations to carry out the activities described in
3	this section; and
4	(3) 1 percent to award grants to, or enter into
5	contracts or cooperative agreements with, the United
6	States Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, the
7	Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands
8	and any other territory or possession of the United
9	States that is not a State to enable those entities to
10	carry out the activities described in this section.
11	(k) Rules.—The Assistant Secretary may prescribe
12	such rules as may be necessary to carry out this section.
13	(l) Authorization of Appropriations.—There
14	are authorized to be appropriated to carry out this sec-
15	tion—
16	(1) \$125,000,000 for each of the first 5 fiscal
17	years in which funds are made available to carry out
18	this section; and
19	(2) such sums as may be necessary for each fis-
20	cal year after the end of the 5-fiscal year period de-
21	scribed in paragraph (1).
22	SEC. 6. POLICY RESEARCH, DATA COLLECTION, ANALYSIS
23	AND MODELING, EVALUATION, AND DISSEMI
24	NATION.
25	(a) Reporting Requirements.—

1	(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after
2	the date on which the Assistant Secretary begins
3	awarding grants under section 4(d)(1), and annually
4	thereafter, the Assistant Secretary shall—
5	(A) submit to the appropriate committees
6	of Congress a report that documents, for the
7	year covered by the report—
8	(i) the findings of each evaluation
9	conducted under subparagraph (B);
10	(ii) a list of each grant awarded under
11	each covered program, which shall in-
12	clude—
13	(I) the amount of each such
14	grant;
15	(II) the recipient of each such
16	grant; and
17	(III) the purpose for which each
18	such grant was awarded;
19	(iii) any deobligation, termination, or
20	modification of a grant awarded under the
21	covered programs, which shall include a
22	description of the subsequent usage of any
23	funds to which such an action applies; and
24	(iv) each challenge made by an appli-

20	(IV) in compliance with any
21	other rules, requirements, or regula-

1	(ii) whether entities to which grants
2	are awarded under the program established
3	under section 5 are—
4	(I) abiding by the assurances
5	made by those entities under sub-
6	section (f) of that section;
7	(II) meeting, or have met, the
8	stated goals of those entities with re-
9	spect to the use of the grant amounts;
10	(III) satisfying the requirements
11	imposed by the Assistant Secretary on

19	(2) Public availability.—The Assistant Sec-
20	retary shall make each report submitted under para-

3	(b) AUTHORITY TO CONTRACT AND ENTER INTO
4	OTHER ARRANGEMENTS.—The Assistant Secretary may
5	award grants and enter into contracts, cooperative agree-
6	ments, and other arrangements with Federal agencies,
7	public and private organizations, and other entities with
8	expertise that the Assistant Secretary determines appro-
9	priate in order to—
10	(1) evaluate the impact and efficacy of activities
11	supported by grants awarded under the covered pro-
12	grams; and
13	(2) develop, catalog, disseminate, and promote
14	the exchange of best practices, both with respect to
15	and independent of the covered programs, in order

17	(c) Consultation and Public Engagement.—In
18	carrying out subsection (a), and to further the objectives
19	described in paragraphs (1) and (2) of subsection (b), the
20	Assistant Secretary shall conduct ongoing collaboration

15	equivalent officials);
16	(14) entities serving as administering entities
17	for States under section 4(b);
18	(15) national, State, tribal, and local organiza-
19	tions that provide digital inclusion, digital equity, or
20	digital literacy services;
21	(16) researchers, academics, and philanthropic
22	organizations; and
23	(17) other agencies, organizations (including
24	international organizations), entities (including enti-
25	ties with expertise in the fields of data collection,

- 4 (d) Technical Support and Assistance.—The
- 5 Assistant Secretary shall provide technical support and as-
- 6 sistance, assistance to entities to prepare the applications

- 9 ticable, to ensure consistency in data reporting and to

- 11 (e) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There

15 SEC. 7. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

- 16 (a) Nondiscrimination.—
- 17 (1) IN GENERAL.—No individual in the United
- 18 States may, on the basis of actual or perceived race,
- 19 color, religion, national origin, sex, gender identity,
- sexual orientation, age, or disability, be excluded
- 21 from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or
- be subjected to discrimination under any program or
- activity that is funded in whole or in part with funds
- 24 made available under this Act.

- 1 (2) Enforcement.—The Assistant Secretary 2 shall effectuate paragraph (1) with respect to any 3 program or activity described in that paragraph by 4 issuing regulations and taking actions consistent 5 with section 602 of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 6 U.S.C. 2000d–1).
- 7 (3) JUDICIAL REVIEW.—Judicial review of an 8 action taken by the Assistant Secretary under para-9 graph (2) shall be available to the extent provided in 10 section 603 of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 11 U.S.C. 2000d–2).
- 12 (b) TECHNOLOGICAL NEUTRALITY.—The Assistant
 13 Secretary shall, to the extent practicable, carry out this
 14 Act in a technologically neutral manner.
- 15 (c) Audit and Oversight.—Beginning in the first
 16 fiscal year in which amounts are made available to carry
 17 out an activity authorized under this Act, and in each of
 18 the 4 fiscal years thereafter, there is authorized to be ap19 propriated to the Office of Inspector General for the De20 partment of Commerce \$1,000,000 for audits and over21 sight of funds made available to carry out this Act, which
 22 shall remain available until expended.
