A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO CREATE THE OFFENSE OF WILLFUL DESTRUCTION, ALTERATION, OR FALSIFICATION OF MEDICAL RECORDS.			
The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:			
SECTION 1. Article 29 of Chapter 90 of the General Statutes is amended by adding			
a new section to read:			
"§ 90-413. Willful destruction, alteration, or falsification of medical records.			
(a) Offense. – It is unlawful for a health care provider to knowingly and willfully destroy,			
alter, or falsify a medical record, or to direct any person to knowingly destroy, alter, or falsify a			
medical record, for any of the following purposes:			
	(1)	Concealing the commission of an error by the health care pro-	ovider in
		providing medical services that caused injury to or the death of a pat	
	(2)	Unlawfully obtaining money or any other thing of value.
