A BILL

To award a gold medal on behalf of the Congress to the U.S. Air Forces Escape and Evasion Society, in recognition of the ceaseless efforts of American aircrew members to escape captivity and evade capture by the enemy forces in occupied countries during our foreign wars, and the brave resistance organizations and patriotic nationals of those foreign countries who assisted them.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 2 This Act may be cited as the "U.S. Air Forces Es-
- 3 cape and Evasion Society Recognition Act of 2017".
- SEC. 2. FINDINGS. 4

- 5 The Congress finds the following:
- 6 (1) During nearly all foreign wars, members of 7 our Air Force have been forced to eject, crash land, 8 or abandon their aircraft in an occupied country or 9 territory (referred to in this Act as "downed aircrew 10 members").
 - (2) Those downed aircrew members had to evade capture by enemy forces, often times while suffering from critical injuries.
 - (3) Of the downed aircrew members that were captured, many escaped from the enemy force that was holding them.
 - (4) Many times, downed aircrew members were aided in evasion and escape by resistance organizations and patriotic nationals in those occupied countries.
- (5) Thousands of brave, ordinary people in the 22 occupied countries took extraordinary risks at huge 23 costs to help these aircrew members.
 - (6) Each downed aircrew member's story is different; however, the narrative for each member has one common thread: American aircrew members

- evading capture or escaping captivity with the assistance of brave people living in an occupied country.
- The second of the U.S. Air Forces Escape and Evasion Society (AFEES) was created by the downed aircrew members who evaded capture by enemy forces during foreign wars with the assistance of resistance organizations and patriotic nationals in occupied countries.
- 9 (8) AFEES includes downed aircrew members 10 and people who directly aided them in escape and 11 evasion, and has more than 600 members, including 12 members from World War II, the Korean War, and 13 the Vietnam War.

14 SEC. 3. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.

(a) Presentation Authorized.—The Speaker of 15 the House of Representatives and the President pro tem-16 17 pore of the Senate shall make appropriate arrangements 18 for the presentation, on behalf of the Congress, of a gold medal of appropriate design in commemoration to the U.S. 19 20 Air Forces Escape and Evasion Society, in recognition of the ceaseless efforts of American aircrew members to es-21 22 cape captivity and evade capture by the enemy forces in 23 occupied countries during our foreign wars, and the brave

- 1 (b) Design and Striking.—For purposes of the
- 2 presentation referred to in subsection (a), the Secretary
- 3 of the Treasury (referred to in this Act as the "Sec-
- 4 retary") shall strike a gold medal with suitable emblems,
- 5 devices, and inscriptions, to be determined by the Sec-
- 6 retary.

7 (c) Smithsonian Institution.—

- 8 (1) In general.—Following the award of the
- 9 gold medal under subsection (a), the gold medal
- shall be given to the Smithsonian Institution, where
- it shall be available for display as appropriate and
- 12 available for research.
- 13 (2) Sense of the congress.—It is the sense
- of the Congress that the Smithsonian Institution
- should make the gold medal awarded pursuant to
- this Act available for display elsewhere, particularly
- at appropriate locations associated with the U.S. Air
- Forces Escape and Evasion Society, and that pref-
- erence should be given to locations affiliated with
- the Smithsonian Institution.

21 SEC. 4. DUPLICATE MEDALS.

- The Secretary may strike and sell duplicates in
- 23 bronze of the gold medal struck pursuant to section 3
- 24 under such regulations as the Secretary may prescribe, at
- 25 a price sufficient to cover the cost thereof, including labor,

- 1 materials, dies, use of machinery, and overhead expenses,
- 2 and the cost of the gold medal.
- 3 SEC. 5. STATUS OF MEDALS.
- 4 (a) National Medals.—The medals struck pursu-
- 5 ant to this Act are national medals for purposes of chapter
- 6 51 of title 31, United States Code.
- 7 (b) Numismatic Items.—For purposes of section
- 8 5134 of title 31, United States Code, all medals struck
- 9 under this Act shall be considered to be numismatic items.
