AN ACT

To establish a comprehensive United States Government initiative to build the capacity of young leaders and entrepreneurs in Africa, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Young African Leaders
- 5 Initiative Act of 2021" or "YALI Act of 2021".
- 6 SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS.
- 7 It is the sense of Congress that—

- 1 (1) the Young African Leaders Initiative, 2 launched in 2010, is a signature effort to invest in 3 the next generation of African leaders;
 - (2) Africa is a continent of strategic importance and it is vital for the United States to support strong and enduring partnerships with the next generation of African leaders; and
- 8 (3) the United States Government should 9 prioritize investments to build the capacity of emerg-10 ing young African leaders in sub-Saharan Africa, in-11 cluding through efforts to enhance leadership skills, 12 encourage entrepreneurship, strengthen public ad-13 ministration and the role of civil society, and connect young African leaders continentally and globally 14 15 across the private, eivie, and public sectors.

16 SEC. 3. YOUNG AFRICAN LEADERS INITIATIVE PROGRAM.

- 17 (a) IN GENERAL.—There is established in the De-18 partment of State the Young African Leaders Initiative
- 19 ("YALI") program.

- 20 (b) PURPOSE.—The YALI program shall seek to
- 21 build the capacity of young African leaders in sub-Saharan
- 22 Africa in the areas of business, civic engagement, or public
- 23 administration, including through efforts to—
- 24 (1) support young African leaders by offering
- 25 professional development, training, and networking

- 1 opportunities, particularly in the areas of leadership,
- 2 innovation, civic engagement, elections, human
- 3 rights, entrepreneurship, good governance, and pub-
- 4 lie administration; and
- 5 (2) provide increased economic and technical
- 6 assistance to young African leaders to promote eco-
- 7 nomic growth and strengthen ties between United
- 8 States and African businesses.
- 9 (e) Fellowships.—The YALI program shall award
- 10 fellowships under the Mandela Washington Fellowship for
- 11 Young African Leaders program to young African leaders
- 12 ages 18 to 35 who have demonstrated strong capabilities
- 13 in entrepreneurship, innovation, public service, and leader-
- 14 ship, and who have had a positive impact in their commu-
- 15 nities, organizations, or institutions.
- 16 (d) Regional Leadership Centers.—The YALI
- 17 program shall seek to establish regional leadership centers
- 18 in sub-Saharan Africa to offer training to young African
- 19 leaders ages 18 to 35 who have demonstrated strong capa-
- 20 bilities in entrepreneurship, innovation, public service and
- 21 leadership, and who have had a positive impact in their
- 22 communities, organizations, or institutions.
- 23 (e) ACTIVITIES.—
- 24 (1) United states-based activities.—The
- 25 Secretary of State, in coordination with the Admin-

istrator for the United States Agency for International Development and the heads of other relevant Federal departments and agencies, shall oversee all United States-based activities carried out under the YALI program, including the following:

(A) The participation of Mandela Washington fellows in a six-week Leadership Institute at a United States university or college in business, civic engagement, or public management, including academic sessions, site visits, professional networking opportunities, leadership training, community service, and organized cultural activities.

(B) The participation by Mandela Washington fellows in an annual Mandela Washington Fellowship Summit, to provide such Fellows the opportunity to meet with United States leaders from the private, public, and non-profit sectors.

(2) AFRICA-BASED ACTIVITIES.—The Secretary of State, in coordination with the Administrator for the United States Agency for International Development and the heads of other relevant Federal departments and agencies, should continue to support

1	YALI programs in sub-Saharan Africa, including the
2	following:
3	(A) Access to continued leadership training
4	and other professional development opportuni-
5	ties for Mandela Washington Fellowship for
6	Young African Leaders alumni upon their re-
7	turn to their home countries, including online
8	courses, technical assistance, and access to
9	funding.
10	(B) Training for young African leaders at
11	regional leadership centers established in ac-
12	cordance with subsection (d), and through on-
13	line and in-person courses offered by such cen-
14	ters.
15	(C) Opportunities for networking and en-
16	gagement with—
17	(i) other alumni of the Mandela
18	Washington Fellowship for Young African
19	Leaders;
20	(ii) alumni of programs at regional
21	leadership centers established in accord-
22	ance with subsection (d); and
23	(iii) United States and like-minded
24	diplomatic missions, business leaders, and
25	others as appropriate.

1 (3) Implementation.—To earry out this sub-2 section, the Secretary of State, in coordination with the Administrator of the United States Agency for 3 4 International Development and the heads of other 5 relevant Federal departments and agencies shall 6 seek to partner with the private sector to pursue 7 public-private partnerships, leverage private sector 8 expertise, expand networking opportunities, and 9 identify funding opportunities as well as fellowship 10 and employment opportunities for participants in the 11 YALI program.

12 (f) IMPLEMENTATION PLAN.—Not later than 180
13 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec14 retary of State, in coordination with the Administrator of
15 the United States Agency for International Development
16 and the heads of other relevant Federal departments and
17 agencies, shall submit to the appropriate congressional
18 committees a plan for implementing the YALI program,
19 including the following:

(1) A description of clearly defined program goals, targets, and planned outcomes for each year and for the duration of implementation of the program.

- 1 (2) A strategy to monitor and evaluate the pro-2 gram and progress made toward achieving such 3 goals, targets, and planned outcomes.
- 4 (3) A strategy to ensure the program is pro5 moting United States foreign policy goals in Africa,
 6 including ensuring that the program is clearly
 7 branded and paired with robust public diplomacy ef8 forts.
- 9 (g) REPORT.—Not later than 1 year after the date
 10 of the enactment of this Act, and annually thereafter for
 11 5 years, the Secretary of State, in coordination with the
 12 Administrator of the United States Agency for Inter13 national Development, shall submit to the appropriate
 14 congressional committees and publish in a publicly acces15 sible, internet—based form, a report on the following:
 - (1) The progress made toward achieving the goals, targets, and planned outcomes described in subsection (f)(1), including an overview of the program implemented in the previous year and an estimated number of beneficiaries.
 - (2) An assessment of how the YALI program is contributing to and promoting United States-Africa relations, particularly in areas of increased private sector investment, trade promotion, support to civil

8	SEC. 3. YOUNG AFRICAN LEADERS INITIATIVE PROGRAM.
9	(a) In General.—There is established the Young Afri-
10	can Leaders Initiative ("YALI"), which shall be carried out
11	by the Secretary of State.
12	(b) Purpose.—YALI shall seek to build the capacity
13	of young African leaders in sub-Saharan Africa in the areas
14	of business, civic engagement, or public administration, in-
15	cluding through efforts to—
16	(1) support young African leaders by offering
17	professional development, training, and networking
18	opportunities, particularly in the areas of leadership,
19	innovation, civic engagement, elections, human rights,
20	entrepreneurship, good governance, peace and secu-
21	rity, and public administration; and
22	(2) provide increased economic and technical as-
23	sistance to young African leaders to promote economic
24	growth, strengthen ties between United States and Af-
25	rican businesses, build resilience to predatory lending

1	practices, and improve capacity in key economic					
2	areas such as tendering, bidding, and contract nego-					
3	tiations, budget management and oversight, anti-cor-					
4	ruption, and establishment of clear policy and regu-					
5	latory practices.					
6	(c) Fellowships.—					
7	(1) In general.—YALI shall support the par-					
8	ticipation in the United States in the Mandela Wash-					
9	ington Fellowship for Young African Leaders of fel-					
10	lows from Africa who—					
11	(A) are between 25 and 35 years of age;					
12	(B) have demonstrated strong capabilities					
13	in entrepreneurship, innovation, public service,					
14	and leadership; and					
15	(C) have had a positive impact in their					
16	communities, organizations, or institutions.					
17	(2) Oversight.—The fellowships described in					
18	paragraph (1) shall be overseen by the Secretary of					
19	State through the Bureau of Education and Cultural					
20	Affairs.					
21	(3) Eligibility.—The Secretary of State shall					
22	establish and publish—					
23	(A) eligibility criteria for participation as					
24	a fellow under paragraph (1): and					

1	(B) criteria for determining which eligible
2	applicants will be selected.
3	(d) Reciprocal Exchanges.—Subject to the ap-
4	proval of the Secretary of State, United States citizens
5	may—
6	(1) engage in reciprocal exchanges in connection
7	with alumni of the fellowship described in subsection
8	(c); and
9	(2) collaborate on projects with such fellowship
10	alumni.
11	(e) Regional Leadership Centers and Net-
12	WORKS.—The Administrator of the United States Agency
13	for International Development shall establish—
14	(1) not fewer than 4 regional leadership centers
15	in sub-Saharan Africa to offer in-person and online
16	training throughout the year on business and entre-
17	preneurship, civic leadership, and public management
18	to young African leaders between 18 and 35 years of
19	age who have demonstrated strong capabilities in en-
20	trepreneurship, innovation, public service and leader-
21	ship, and peace-building and conflict resolution, and
22	who have had a positive impact in their communities,
23	organizations, or institutions; and

1 (2) an online network that provides information 2 and courses on, and connections with leaders in, the private and public sectors of Africa. 3 4 (f) ACTIVITIES.— UnitedSTATES-BASED ACTIVITIES.—The 6 Secretary of State, in coordination with the heads of relevant Federal departments and agencies, shall over-7 8 see all United States-based activities carried out under YALI, including— 9 (A) the participation of Mandela Wash-10 11 ington Fellows in a six-week Leadership Institute at a United States educational institution 12 13 in business, civic engagement, or public manage-14 ment, including academic sessions, site visits, 15 professional networking opportunities, leadership 16 training, community service, and organized cul-17 tural activities; and 18 (B) the participation by Mandela Wash-19 ington fellows in an annual Mandela Wash-20 ington Fellowship Summit, to provide such Fel-21 lows the opportunity to meet with United States 22 leaders from the private, public, and non-profit 23 sectors. 24 (2) AFRICA-BASED ACTIVITIES.—The Secretary

of State, in coordination with the Administrator for

1	the United States Agency for International Develop-
2	ment and the heads of other relevant Federal depart-
3	ments and agencies, should continue to support YALI
4	activities in sub-Saharan Africa, including—
5	(A) continued leadership training and other
6	professional development opportunities for
7	Mandela Washington Fellowship for Young Afri-
8	can Leaders alumni upon their return to their
9	home countries, including online courses, tech-
10	nical assistance, and access to funding;
11	(B) training for young African leaders at
12	regional leadership centers established in accord-
13	ance with subsection (e), and through online and
14	in-person courses offered by such centers; and
15	(C) opportunities for networking and en-
16	gagement with—
17	(i) alumni of the Mandela Washington
18	Fellowship for Young African Leaders;
19	(ii) alumni of programs at regional
20	leadership centers established in accordance
21	with subsection (e);
22	(iii) United States and like-minded
23	diplomatic missions, business leaders, and
24	others as appropriate; and

1 where practicable and appro-(iv)2 priate, other United States-funded regional leadership programs, including the Young 3 Initiative 4 Southeast Asian Leaders (YSEALI), the Young Leaders of the Amer-5 6 icas Initiative (YLAI), the Young Pacific 7 Leaders (YPL), and the Young Trans-8 atlanticInnovation Leaders Initiative 9 (YTILI), and through Department of State 10 programs such as the Community Engage-11 ment Exchange Program and other initia-12 tives.

(3) Implementation.—To carry out this subsection, the Secretary of State, in coordination with the Administrator of the United States Agency for International Development and the heads of other relevant Federal departments and agencies shall seek to partner with the private sector to pursue public-private partnerships, leverage private sector expertise, expand networking opportunities, and identify funding opportunities as well as fellowship and employment opportunities for YALI.

23 (g) Implementation Plan.—Not later than 180 days 24 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary 25 of State, in coordination with the Administrator of the

- 20 (h) REPORT.—Not later than 1 year after the date of 21 the enactment of this Act, and annually thereafter for 5 22 years, the Secretary of State, in coordination with the Ad-23 ministrator of the United States Agency for International 24 Development, shall submit to the appropriate congressional

- 3 (1) a description of the progress made toward 4 achieving the goals, targets, and planned outcomes de-5 scribed in subsection (g)(1), including an overview of 6 the program implemented in the previous year and 7 an estimated number of beneficiaries:
 - (2) an assessment of how YALI is contributing to and promoting United States-Africa relations, particularly in areas of increased private sector investment, trade promotion, support to civil society, improved public administration, promoting peace and security, and fostering entrepreneurship and youth empowerment;
 - (3) recommendations for improvements or changes to YALI and the implementation plan, if any, that would improve their effectiveness during subsequent years of YALI's implementation; and
- 19 (4) for the first report submitted under this sub-20 section, an assessment of the feasibility of expanding 21 YALI to Morocco, Algeria, Tunisia, Libya, and 22 Egypt.
